A RESOLUTION TO EXPAND THE DISTRICT CABINET POSITIONS AVAILABLE TO QUALIFY A MEMBER FOR THE OFFICE OF SECOND VICE DISTRICT GOVERNOR BY INCLUDING GLOBAL ACTION TEAM AND DISTRICT LCIF COORDINATOR POSITIONS. (THIS AMENDMENT TO THE BY-LAWS REQUIRES A MAJORITY VOTE TO ADOPT)

SHALL THE FOLLOWING RESOLUTION BE ADOPTED? BE IT RESOLVED, That the International By-Laws, Article IX, Section 6(c)(3)(b) be removed in its entirety, and replaced with:

As zone chairperson, region chairperson, district global extension team coordinator, district global leadership team coordinator, district global membership team coordinator, district global service team coordinator, district LCIF coordinator, or cabinet secretary and/or treasurer for a full term or major portion thereof.

#### ITEM 2:

A RESOLUTION TO REQUIRE APPROVAL OF SUB-DISTRICTS PRIOR TO REDISTRICTING IF THE SUB-DISTRICT MEETS SPECIFIC CRITERIA. (THIS AMENDMENT TO THE BY-LAWS REQUIRES A MAJORITY VOTE TO ADOPT)

SHALL THE FOLLOWING RESOLUTION BE ADOPTED?

BE IT RESOLVED, That the International By-Laws, Article VIII, Section 3, Sentence 2 be removed in its entirety, and replaced with:

Any multiple district which desires to consolidate one or more subdistricts shall submit to the International Board of Directors a redistricting proposal approved by a majority of the convention of the affected districts with 1,000 or more members, or districts under 1,000 members with an average net growth of 1% over the previous two years, and the multiple district.

#### **AUDIT COMMITTEE**

 The committee received an update from Lions Clubs International Internal Audit and will continue to follow up and monitor action plans.

#### **CONSTITUTION & BY-LAWS COMMITTEE**

- 1. Denied an election complaint in District 25-F (Indiana, USA) and affirmed the international director endorsement of Lion Reed Fish.
- 2. Approved the "International Foundation of Lions Clubs Walled Cities" as a foundation.
- Approved use of "ChildSight U.K." by Multiple District 105 (British Isles) as a descriptor of the "Lions KidSight USA" program, contingent upon proper recognition of "Lions KidSight USA."
- 4. Updated the Board Policy Manual, Chapter XV. Legal, Paragraph C. CONSTITUTIONAL INTERPRETATION, clarifying that an international officer endorsement shall remain valid until an endorsed candidate: a) is elected, b) contests for office and is not elected, or c) holds an endorsement for 3 years without seeking election. This provision is not effective until July 1, 2024.
- 5. Updated the Board Policy Manual, Chapter II. Board Committees, Paragraph C. CONSTITUTION & BY-LAWS COMMITTEE, Section 3. Duties, clarifying the methods of communication among committee members in order to obtain a majority opinion on matters of constitutional interpretation that do not require board action.
- Updated The Board Policy Manual, Chapter XV. Legal Paragraph J. updating when "Lions International" may be utilized.
- 7. Approved proposal of amendment to the International By-Laws, Article IX., Section 6 to expand qualifying positions for a second vice district governor candidate to include the district global extension team coordinator, global leadership team coordinator, global membership team coordinator, global service team coordinator and LCIF coordinator.
- Approved proposal of amendment to the International By-Laws, Article VIII., Section 2(c), Paragraph 2, to update the guidelines for district approval when a consolidation of districts is proposed.

#### **CONVENTION COMMITTEE**

1. Discussed and confirmed no adjustment to the registration fee structure for the 2025 International Convention.

 Confirmed the bidding cities for the 2030 and 2031 International Convention and will be formally presented for selection at the June 2024 board meeting, prior to the 2024 International Convention.

- 1. Instructed the treasurer to donate the entire treasury balance, after payment of all debts, to the Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) at the time the Lions International Stamp Club is dissolved.
- Requested the Navirai Centro Lions Club be moved from District LD-9 (Brazil) to District LB-1 (Brazil) prior to April 30, 2024.
- 3. Requested the Taoyuan Heritage Lions Club be moved from District 300B-5 to District 300B-3 prior to April 30, 2024.
- 4. Approved the Lion leaders to serve as the coordinating Lions for 2024-2025 fiscal year.
- 5. Approved the requirements for the Club Excellence Award for 2024-2025 fiscal year.
- 6. Approved the requirements for the District Excellence Award for 2024-2025 fiscal year.

#### FINANCE & HEADQUARTERS OPERATION COMMITTEE

- 1. Approved the FY 2023-2024 3rd Quarter Forecast, reflecting a surplus.
- Approved authorizing Past International Director Jaime Garcia Cepeda as the Lions Clubs International legal representative in Colombia.
- 3. Approved seven clubs from District 334-E, Japan, be placed on modified protective status for the period of January 1, 2024 through December 31, 2024.
- 4. Approved the country of Egypt be placed on modified protective status for the period of January 1, 2024 through June 30, 2024.
- 5. Approved revisions of Chapter IX, District Officers and Organization, of the Board Policy Manual to streamline the district governor expense claim reimbursement process and provide more flexibility in planning visits during the district governor's year in office. Removed Connect as an option for conducting virtual meetings.
- Approved revisions of Chapter XXI, Travel and Expense Reimbursement, of the Board Policy Manual to provide clarity for past international director in-district travel to Lions events.
- 7. Approved revisions of Chapter XXIII, Area Forums of the Board Policy Manual to clarify

Approved revisions of Chapter B.1., Executive Officer Reimbursement Policy of the Board Policy Manual to update the policy to reflect the changes to board meeting locations and costs, and to remove a discretionary day from the board meeting schedule effective in the 2027-2028 fiscal year. In addition, clarified items that are included in the list of awards and gifts purchased annually for the president's year as part of the association's budget.




# St Davids Lions - Lions Quest Fellowship

On Thursday, March 7th, Lion **Gary Martins** was awarded the Ontario Senior Achievement Award by The Honourable Edith Dumont, Lieutenant Governor of Ontario and the Honourable Raymond Cho, Minister for Seniors and Accessibility for the Province of Ontario. Lion Gary was nominated by his friends Dorina Lehman, Veronica Bruckschwaiger and Lion **Dave Mitchell** of **Lambeth Lions**. The following is a composite of their individual nomination letters.

Lion Gary Martins is an extraordinary person. He is totally dedicated to helping people. You could say volunteering is in his blood as evidenced by his 50 plus years of service as a member of Lions International. For over 15 years Lion Gary led the Lambeth club members in

the making of oak, dovetailed memory boxes in his basement workshop. Over 750 Memory Boxes were donated to the Neonatal Critical Care Unit at the London Children's Hospital. These boxes are given by the nurses to parents who have lost their child. The parents use these handmade boxes to hold the treasured items of their wee ones. This one of a kind project continues now and for the future using commercially made boxes paid for by the Lambeth Lions.

Lion Gary, using the knowledge

gained as a career teacher of the deaf and teacher of the blind, worked with Lion *Jack Graydon* and the Lions Homes for Deaf People board for 43 years to build or purchase numerous homes and facilities for people who are deaf and have additional handicaps. As MDA Chair for Hearing Conservation and Work for the Deaf for 15 years he promoted LHDP homes, telecaptioning for television, teletype units for phone (TTY), TTY for 911 emergency service, purchase of hearing aids for indigent children and protection of personal hearing.

Lion Gary is the recipient of the Melvin Jones Fellowship, the Helen Keller Fellowship, International Presidents Medal and two International President Awards. In 2013 Gary was



honoured when a new home for people who are deaf/blind was opened in London. It is known as the Lions Martins Home in recognition of Gary's timeless fundraising efforts.

It is not just the years and years of volunteering that makes Gary special. It is in his nature to show kindness and generosity to his family, friends and strangers. This world is a better place because of him and that is why Gary is a perfect candidate for the Ontario Volunteer Service Award.



# Harry A Newman Award History

This award was first presented to Lion **Evelyn Fisher**, then of the **Courtice Lions** on October 25, 2005 by PID Lion **Terry Graham**.

Lion Evelyn has a passion for working to reduce the incidence of diabetes. As a Lion she has volunteered on behalf of the Canadian Diabetes Association (CDA) to promote an awareness of the health problems of diabetes. Her involvement was recognized by CDA with a selection as a voting delegate at several annual conferences. She attended conferences in Edmonton and Vancouver and twice in Toronto as well as the International Diabetes Conference in Montreal in 2009. Her husband Lion Jack attended with Lion Evelyn. They are both now members of the K-W Community Spirit Lions.

At the Edmonton conference, there was a Liaison Committee meeting, made up of representatives from all Provinces, except Quebec. Lion Jack was present as an observer.

The topic was the concept of a special award to help diabetes research in Canada. It was named in honour of **Harry A Newman**, who served as the first Canadian President of Lions International in 1924-25. The discussion was led by Lion **Larry Sales** PDG-A15, a member of the **Sweaburg and** 

**District Lions**. He had had a sample award made. It was late 2005, with the thought that the award would not likely be given until 2006, the

sample had the date 2006, with Larry's name.

Jack suggested to the Committee that the first award should be presented to Lion Larry, who worked so hard to get the needed approvals from Lions International, and as they already had the award available with Larry's name on it. However, the committee thought the award should be given by Lions, Lioness, or Leos and not by the CDA.

The award idea was accepted by this committee and then presented to CDA, who agreend to the idea and brought it forward to the conference where it was approved. Since

the CDA was not going to give the first award to Lion Larry, Jack thought why not have the Courtice Lions Club give the award to their Lion Evelyn. The Courtice Lions had a meeting on the Tuesday following the Conference, at which time they approved giving the award to Lion Evelyn. At the next Club meeting on October 25, 2005, PID Lion **Terry Graham** attended and presented the first Harry A Newman Diabetes Award to Lion Evelyn Fisher.

And as they say the rest is history.....





# Goderich Lions "Young Canada Week"

YOUNG CANADA WEEK (YCW) began as a hockey tournament for kids under 13 at a time when there was limited organized hockey for that age group. Pee-Wee hockey was in its infancy. The founding fathers saw a need to improve the profile of that age and began the legacy with the first Young Canada Week in 1950.

The tournament was played during the spring school break at the newly constructed Goderich Memorial arena. It started in 1950 as a 1-day tournament of 12 local teams and grew to 26 teams in 1951, 37 in 1952, 60 in 1955, 87 in 1965 and finally in 1967 (Canada's Centennial year) 100 teams in a 9-day tournament – one for each of Canada's 100 years.

The number of teams playing in a tournament on a single ice pad made it necessary for the tournament to be a single knock-out tournament. Teams from across Canada and the United States travelled to Goderich knowing that their tournament could end with a single game.

During these years it grew to be known as "the biggest-little hockey tournament in the world". Names of many currently well-known professional players played in Young Canada Week.

Over the years the location and structure has changed but YCW continues to be strong under a solid partnership with Goderich Minor Hockey and the Goderich Lions Club. The home of YCW since 2004 is the Maitland Recreation Center in Goderich. This Year's round robin tournament ran from March 8 to March 16 with 44 teams from U-13, U-15 and U-18 participating in 90 games. Also new this year were amazing new hockey jerseys for the Goderich Lions Volunteers worn with pride for our beloved tournament.

2025 will see the 74th edition of Young Canada Week (2 lost because of covid) and thanks to the pride of the people in the town of Goderich, the Lions Club and Goderich Minor Hockey, the "Grand-Daddy of all Hockey Tournaments" still thrives.



# Nurturing Hearts and Minds: The Lions Quest Journey at Lincoln Elementary School

"When we provide programs like Lions Quest, it's something our children will carry for the rest of their lives," says Dr. Tamara Young, director of student services at Lincoln Elementary School in Calumet City, Illinois. "One day they are going to be the leaders of our community, so we want to invest in our students and understand the type of curriculum that can be supportive of building their character."

In March 2020, the school implemented the Lions Quest social and emotional learning (SEL) program using a Lions Quest Community Partnership Grant from Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) in the amount of US\$8,676. As a comprehensive and universal, evidence-based SEL program, Lions Quest helps children and adults acquire and effectively apply the knowledge, attitudes and skills necessary to understand and manage emotions, set and achieve goals, feel and show empathy for others, establish positive relationships, and make responsible decisions.

"We were able to utilize that money to build our program to start the foundation of our Lions Quest curriculum, which helps us develop responsible citizens and grow our community," she says.

Dr. Young loves her job. Early on, she found her passion while working with special needs students. Through her career, she progressed from being a case manager to her current role, and her background in social work has shaped her approach to SEL. She believes in understanding her students and teaching them to be understanding of each other, which is one of the reasons she is such a strong supporter of Lions

Quest. She says when you work with children, "You're not dealing with a piece of a child but the whole child." Moreover, she uses Lions Quest to help students embrace each other's differences, whether those differences are cultural, racial or related to their home lives.

Samantha Surges, a teacher at the school, says the students have taken the lessons they've learned through this program and are applying them in their lives. "I really have seen the kids be able to identify how they're feeling and then act appropriately," she says. Building a child's emotional intelligence is very important and helps them thrive in all aspects of their lives, including in school. Lions Quest and Lincoln Elementary School are taking steps to ensure students' emotions are being properly nurtured.

The program was particularly helpful throughout the global pandemic, when students

and administrators had to shift to online learning. They ensured that the students continued to receive their Lions Quest lessons throughout their remote learning. When schools reopened for in-person learning after several months away, the school implemented Lions Quest programming to help returning students and students who had never been in a classroom adjust to the new setting. Even today, the school continues to prioritize Lions Quest in the curriculum.

"Lions Quest is a gift of hope," Dr. Young says.
"It is a program that gives students the skills they will need to be successful in any environment."

opportunities. The Lions provided the facility and food, including their famous french fries. It was a great day for the basset rescue operation, very informative and entertaining.



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
