# **Breathing Life into Service**

Ask Fabricio Oliveira about his native Brazil, and he'll tell you it's the lungs of the world. An evergreen canopy rimmed in turquoise shoreline. He's from a small municipality there, the son of fabric merchants with entrepreneurial vigor in their blood.

By age 18, Fabrício was already part of the family business. He would focus on his studies during the week and travel dutifully for work over the weekends. For such a young man, Fabrício was driven and focused on results.

"I've always done things early," he recalls with a smile.

At just 22 years old, the spirited entrepreneur became a happily married man. He and his wife Amariles had both grown up in the village of Catolé do Rocha, where, despite the region's tropical climate, Fabrício Oliveira was proving to be a man for all seasons.

He was already having professional success—he had a number of business deals under his belt and more on the table. He was experiencing civic success—he had received several appointments to public office. Yet, something was missing for Fabricio.

Until one evening in 1985.

At the time, Fabrício and Amariles were part of a group of friends who would gather on weekends for different social events. Some of these friends were already Lions members and before long, they asked the Oliveiras to join their local club.

"We couldn't say no," he admits. "These were our close friends. And I saw something special in Lions, and an opportunity to give back to the community that had been so good to me."

It was a gesture as simple as an invitation that brought Fabrício Oliveira and his wife to Lions, once and for all.

"So I became a Lion. And that's how everything started," Fabricio recollects.

The call had been answered. A commitment to service set in motion. Now, it was time for the man from Catolé do Rocha to take what he'd learned so far from life and apply it to a new kind of work. His work as a Lion.

# The Art of Proactive Positivity

"We have natural beauty," Fabricio says of Brazil. "And it's extraordinary."

But years ago, when he was just becoming a Lion, there were areas within his hometown struggling to get clean, usable water. So Fabrício and his club took action.

His very first service project focused on the fundraising required to purchase the handmade, ceramic filters needed to deliver fresh water to these local areas in need. These devices brought more than fresh water to these communities—they brought health, well-being and happiness to children and families who desperately needed it. "It was phenomenal!" Fabricio remembers. "We saw the joy and the smiles they had when we brought the equipment. I really understood just how powerful service could be, and just how important we are as Lions."

From that moment, there was no turning back. Only forward momentum. It was as if the gift of service had found him and not the other way around.

As a Lion, Fabrício puts his life experience and business expertise into practice every day. And he finds that he gets as much as he gives. "I REALLY UNDERSTOOD JUST HOW POWERFUL SERVICE COULD BE, AND JUST HOW IMPORTANT WE ARE AS LIONS."

"I learned a lot. And I am still learning," he says. "Lions is my second university."

But for the man from Catolé do Rocha, Lions have become a second family too, a global family with such incredible potential and rare positivity that he cherishes, a family he is honored to lead by proactive example.

"Lions have made such a big difference in so many communities, and in so many lives—including my own."

That's why Fabrício wants to focus on inviting new members and starting new clubs so even more people can experience the same satisfaction and the same sense of purpose that he has. Fabrício Oliveira will always be a Lion. And he will always think like an entrepreneur. That's why he believes that initiative comes to those who take it. That we not only have the power to achieve great things, but we also have the responsibility to achieve great things.

And when we apply our talents and skills to transforming our communities, we can leave a lasting mark—our mark—on the world.

### Lions Quest: Empowering Youth Across the Globe by Shelby Washington

Over the course of four decades, Lions Quest has made a profound impact on youth, experienced exponential growth and formed meaningful partnerships to help young people reach their full potential.

Lions Ouest is Lions Clubs International Foundation's (LCIF) comprehensive and universal, evidence-based social and emotional learning program. This year marks the 40th anniversary of LCIF's first grant to what used to be the independent organization, Quest International.

Over the years, the two organizations grew closer, leading LCIF to purchase the program in 2002. To date, LCIF has awarded more than 360 grants for a cumulative total of more than US\$20 million to expand or establish Lions Quest programs across the United States and around the world. Exponential growth has been the natural result of this investment, with 20 million students reached in 40 languages across 110 countries.

Lions Quest's story began in 1975, when a determined teenager named Rick Little set out on a "quest" to help other young people develop the skills and strength of character needed to succeed as adults. Little started his journey by conducting a survey of more than 2,000 high school students to truly understand the issues that concerned them most. This initial success prompted expansion into programming for middle school students and the development of Skills for Adolescence, which pioneered a social and emotional learning

program for young people before it was a trend.

With the same spirit of innovation, Lions Quest has undertaken a full-scale revision of the curriculum, training and supplemental content. "Youth today are not like youth 10 to 15 years ago," said Alvin Atkinson of the Winston-Salem Twin City Host Lions Club. "Fortunately, because Lions Quest is evidencebased, it sees what works and

what doesn't and evolves as technology and our lives evolve."

In the new curriculum, materials are being revised to be more dynamic and studentcentered, while also being shorter and more streamlined. The goal is to make the lessons easier to use and more effective. Each curated resource works seamlessly to help children and young adults acquire and effectively apply the knowledge and skills necessary to understand and manage emotions, set and achieve goals, feel and show empathy for others, establish positive relationships and make responsible decisions.

"I think the social and emotional learning pieces of the Lions Quest program are critical," said Chip Harris, trainer at Lions Quest. "They were critical when I started my career over 40 years ago, and they're equally, maybe more important today, largely because social and emotional learning brings people together, and allows them to be able to respect and appreciate each other."

Over the past 40 years, Lions Quest has shaped social and emotional learning for millions of young people around the world. As the program evolves, it will continue offering students curriculum and resources to build the skills needed to navigate life and prevent bullying and substance abuse. This proactive evolution will propel Lions Quest's legacy of innovation into the next decade.

### A Path to Restoration: LCIF's Response to Japan's Noto Earthquake by Shelby Washington

On January 1, 2024, a massive earthquake ripped through the Noto Peninsula of Ishikawa Prefecture, Japan. This earthquake had a moment magnitude of 7.5 and a focal depth of 10 kilometers (6.2 miles), resulting in a massive trail of destruction that included 245 confirmed deaths and 1,298 injuries. At least 89,666 structures were damaged, including over 76,000 houses, leaving families stranded without a roof over their heads. People were forced to live in evacuation shelters for months and thousands of households went without running water.

"This is the most devastating earthquake we've seen in this area in eight years. Thousands of people's lives were torn apart from this catastrophe," said Lion Norio Kataoka of Kanazawa Kikusui Lions Club and zone chair of Shigeru Sugimoto.

This record-breaking disaster is the deadliest earthquake in Japan since the 2016 Kumamoto earthquakes and the largest earthquake to strike Ishikawa since at least 1885. After seeing how many lives this earthquake impacted, Lions quickly took action. Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) awarded US\$200,000 to Lions in Japan for disaster relief and an LCIF Rescue Committee was established.

Lions used their LCIF grant to support the immediate needs of affected families. They distributed sanitary items, disposable heating pads, cardboard beds, water, bags of wash-free rice, vegetable juice, sandbags, oral hygiene products and diapers. However, providing these supplies was not easy.

The roads leading to the affected region were difficult for Lions to navigate, as the already narrow streets were cluttered with debris from collapsed houses. With transportation posing a formidable challenge, Lions purchased eight mini trucks to reach as many people as possible. Beyond these essentials, the grant also purchased tents for Lions to use as outdoor soup kitchens, where people could come together for a warm meal and mutual support. These heartfelt initiatives were made in an effort to restore a sense of normalcy and connection among the victims whose lives were disrupted.

"It is hard to describe the fear and confusion that comes with a terrible disaster like this one, but we are resilient and together, we will rebuild," said District Governor Susumu Koide of District 334-D. "We are so grateful to LCIF for helping us







through this tragic event. They are restoring the hope everyone thought they had lost."

Even under the toughest conditions, Lions are committed to helping communities recover from disaster with hope. LCIF Disaster Relief Grants enable Lions to look beyond the chaos of these catastrophes and focus on impactful community service. As the only global foundation serving Lions, LCIF is grateful to be able to provide a variety of grant opportunities to support different phases of disaster relief efforts made possible by the generous contributions of donors worldwide.

"When disasters strike, Lions are among the first to respond to the needs of the people impacted," 2023-2024 LCIF Chairperson Brian Sheehan said. "Our members live and work in the region and will remain poised to help communities continue to rebuild long after this tragedy. LCIF is proud to be able to support their efforts."

At the recent Port Colborne Lions Carnival the most popular food item at the event: the Lion's Club doughnut. The Lion's Club has been frying up doughnuts for more than 30 years, sold by a "Lion's dozen," 14 doughnuts, a recent addition, and offering two each of the seven flavours — plain, icing sugar, cinnamon, vanilla, chocolate, maple and mixed berry — for only \$10 per box.

The sweet treats sold out most nights, as they do every year. The pastries are painstakingly handmade, from a recipe fine-tuned over three decades to create a delicate, light and fluffy cake delicacy which sees souls lining up for hours to get their hands on a box of the delicious halos.

**Scott Wolfe**, a Lions member and head baker, has been working the doughnut fryer from the start and has helped hone the recipe into a crowd favourite. "Thirty years ago, I don't know how anybody could have eaten them, they were made with lard," he said. "When you cooked them, they were not floating, you had to find them, but every year we make them a little better." Wolfe said everything from the frying to the decorating has been improved, and he believes that is why they are a crowd favourite. Friday night, Wolfe estimated the club sold about 500 boxes of doughnuts or 7,000 individual doughnuts,

between 6 p.m. and 11 p.m. "If you make 600 doughnuts an hour, that's pretty much capacity," he said.

As a former maintenance foreman at the Port Colborne Inco plant, Wolfe modified the current doughnut fryer to specifications needed to fulfil the demand. "We designed it — you won't see this doughnut maker anywhere else in the world," he said. "It's the right depth, the right heating element, so you need to have a good heat sink as your temperature must be perfect or the doughnuts will be the lousiest."

Wolfe stressed doughnuts are unforgiving and even if one thing is off, it will be a waste of time.

"If you screw one thing up - the batter, the temperature, the type of oil - they'll just be

globs of dough," he said. Wolfe added on any given doughnut-making day, the chefs use eight 20-kilo bags of flour donated by a local flour mill, which he said wished to remain anonymous.

Wolfe said making as many doughnuts as they do requires teamwork. Wolfe mans a crew of up to 14 people, who work hard to ensure everything is perfect when it comes to giving people the doughnuts they desire. "They're fantastic. You must have a good crew and I'm lucky I have an excellent crew. The event proceeds are directed towards the Lions Foundation of Canada Dog Guides program, "It's where the money goes," he said.








### Palmerston Lions -Significant Year

### Oro District Lions -Recent Activity and a Little History



Shorty joined the North Bay Lions in 1967 and is still an active member. During his years as a Lion, he has been presented with the Helen Keller Award, Melvin Jones and Judge Brian Stevenson Fellowships. He has held positions as President, Zone Chair, Region Chair, Vice President, Board of Directors and any committee that needed his help.

Some things people did not know about Lion Shorty was his philanthropic side. He was generous with his time or donating prizes. When I visited him in the hospital recently, he was looking forward to moving into a retirement home due to his issues with walking. However, he assures us he will be at the North Bay Lions meetings that start again in the fall. A dedicated Lion that all who know him, love him. Looking forward to many more years Lion Shorty.

### Down Under - MDA at Lions International Convention 2024


