Courage, strength and wisdom can come from the most unlikely sources. Malala Yousafzai stands five feet tall—tall enough to stand up to the Taliban. As a young girl in Pakistan, she demanded that girls receive an

education. A Taliban

gunman shot her in the head in 2012, but she survived and received the Nobel Peace Prize in 2014 for continuing to advocate for girls' education.

In accepting the Nobel, she knew she stood for so many others. "I am also Shazia. I am Kainat [two girls who also were shot]," she said in her powerful speech. "I am Mezon [a Syrian refugee]. I am Amina

[threatened by Boko Haram in Nigeria]. I am those 66 million girls who are deprived of education. And today I am not raising my voice. It is the voice of those 66 million girls."

My presidential theme revolves around "dignity, harmony and humanity." I believe that our essential mission as Lions is to perform service that enables people to live with dignity. We especially need to aid children, our future. We need to help children who are fighting disease, children who are in refugee camps, children who are suffering from hunger. We need to help children escape the vicious cycle of poverty. We need to provide children with education and literacy through the Reading Action Program. We need to do so much more.

Now is the time for each Lion to take action to serve children in need around the world. Our future depends on it. Malala's passionate call to action to help youths must ring true to Lions today in the same way as Helen Keller's plea to help the blind resonated with Lions 90 years ago. As Malala said, "We have already taken many steps. Now is the time to take a leap. ... We must work, not wait. Not just the politicians and world leaders, we all need to contribute. Me. You. We. It is our duty."

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE NOVEMBER, 2015 GOVERNORS' COUNCIL MEETING



ELECTION OF THE COUNCIL CHAIR – MD'A' Secretary John Stewart advised that the MD'A' Policy & Procedures Manual had been updated to include the change to the election of the Council Chairperson. The qualifications to seek the office are as follows:

- Any sitting District Governor wishing to stand for the office of Council Chairperson shall submit his/her name to the Council Secretary at least thirty (30) days prior to the date of the February/March Governors' Council Meeting.
- A Past District Governor wishing to stand for the
 office of Council Chairperson may only submit
 his/her name if the sitting District Governor from
 that sub-District has indicated they will not be
 seeking the office of Council Chairperson. In
 this manner, a sub-District will only be permitted
 one (1) candidate for the office of Council
 Chairperson. A Past District Governor shall be
 permitted only one (1) attempt to seek the office
 of Council Chairperson
- The Past District Governor shall be a Lion in good standing in a Club in good standing in Multiple District 'A' and shall have served as District Governor in one (1) of the three (3) preceding years and shall be subject to the following criteria:
 - (a) He/she has maintained an active role at the sub-District level and at the Multiple District level either as a Cabinet Member or a Committee Chair or an instructor/presenter at a MD'A' Training Session or USA/Canada Forum:
 - (b) The Past District Governor shall submit his/her name to the Council Secretary at least fifteen (15) days prior to the February/March Governors' Council Meeting, together with a

letter of endorsement from his/her District Cabinet supporting their request to seek the office of Council Chairperson. If the sitting District Governor does not plan to seek the office of Council Chairperson, he/she is requested to inform the previous three (3) District Governors thirty (30) days prior to the February/March Governors' Council Meeting advising of their opportunity to apply, if they so wish and if they meet the above criteria. However, it is ultimately the responsibility of a Past District Governor to determine if his/her sitting District Governor intends to stand for the position of Council Chairperson and to provide documentation that he/she has met the required criteria.

MD'A' CONVENTION ADVISORY – The Widdifield Lions Club and the Bonfield & District Lions Club, District A5, will be co-hosting the 2016 MD'A' Convention on May 26-29, 2016 in North Bay. Our International Guests will be LCI 1st Vice President Bob Corlew and his wife, Lion Diane. Elections will be held for the candidates seeking the MD'A' endorsement for International Director for Canada. Registration Forms for the Convention and the Stew O'Brien Golf Tournament are available on the MD'A' website.

USA/CANADA LEADERSHIP FORUM – The Governors' Council authorized the completion of a Bid Form to host the 2020 USA/Canada Leadership Forum in Niagara Falls, Ontario.

LIONS QUEST – A Grant in the amount of \$10,000. has been received from LCIF. The money will be used to fund five community workshops. District interested in hosting a workshop should contact Lion Joanne McQuiggan at the Lions Quest Canada office.

GIFT OF LIFE – PDG Eleanor Colwell encouraged all Lions to register as an organ & tissue donor in one of

three ways; Online at www.beadonor.ca; In person at ServiceOntario; Downloading the consent form from the beadonor website. The next step is to keep your family apprised of your intentions.

OPPORTUNITIES FOR YOUTH – The MD'A' Effective Speaking Finals will be held on the first weekend in May, 2016 at Algonquin College in Ottawa. An Opportunities for Youth Luncheon is being planned for the MD'A' Convention in North Bay.

SPECIAL OLYMPICS – The Canadian Winter Games are being held in March, 2016 in Corner Brook, Newfoundland. Volunteers are needed.

LION MAGAZINE – PDG John Daniels stated that Lions Clubs International has advised that the Lion Magazine is going digital. By the year 2018 International will be producing 4 hard copies & 12 digital copies. Funding from LCI for the MD'A' magazine will be reduced. He indicated that additional information in respect to costs of producing a MD'A' digital magazine will be available for the March Council Meeting. The Governors' Council approved a 28 page or 32 page edition of the Lion Magazine for the January/February issue to provide space to recognize Centennial celebrations in 2017.

TREASURY – MD'A' Treasurer Dave Hewitt presented the 2015-2016 audited financial statement which stated, in part, "In our opinion, the financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Multiple District 'A' Lions Clubs as at June 30, 2015 and its financial performance and its cash flows for the year ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations."

Imagine you need a kidney transplant—imagine the anxiety and stress of putting your health in someone else's hands. Now imagine traveling to a new city to get the operation, knowing you don't have—or can't afford—a place to stay during your recovery.

This is the situation facing many people who travel to Madison, Wisconsin, for transplant operations at the University of Wisconsin Hospital and Clinics, and lack the resources or social connections to secure housing while they're in town. Transplants are complex surgical procedures that typically require significant time for recovery and preparation, so having a place to stay is essential to a successful operation.

Thankfully, there's hope.

Since January 2013, Restoring Hope Transplant House (RHTH) has been a home away from home for patients who are in the Madison area to receive medical transplants. The home provides up to six weeks of temporary housing for transplant patients—and their adult family members and caregivers—in an environment that offers compassion and supports healing.

And it works. In fact, it works so well that there

often aren't enough beds for potential residents.

After learning that the house was experiencing weeks at a time without vacancy, the Lions from Multiple District 27 D1 decided to help. In addition to fundraising, Lions secured a \$75,000 Standard Grant from Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) to help fund an expansion of RHTH.

The first phase of RHTH's expansion plan, completed in the summer, includes the renovation of the current patient rooms to include double and twinsized beds, as well as the improvement of a community kitchen, on-site laundry and other amenities.

With the second phase of the expansion plan, set to begin in the near future, RHTH hopes to expand its capacity from five private rooms to 16, dramatically increasing its ability to serve patients in need.

After years of fundraising and with contributions from 10 different districts, Lions' and LCIF's contributions have helped RHTH secure more than \$200,000 of the more than \$1 million required for the expansion.

"We are so grateful for [Lions'] support of transplant families and Restoring Hope Transplant House," says Cindy Herbst, Executive Director and co-founder of RHTH. "We are beyond words with your extremely generous donation that will allow us to expand this home. The stories of our guests are moving and powerful. Having the Lions as partners gives us greater courage, resolve, compassion and energy to do the right thing in serving others."

Caring for Mothers and their Babies in Ecuador

At meetings in their clubhouse Quito Lions trade gossip, jest with one another and plan projects. Next to the clubhouse is a concrete reminder of their commitment to service: the **Quito los Olivos Lions** have operated a community medical center in the space adjacent to its clubhouse since 1997.

Funded by modest patient fees, the Quito los Olivos Medical Center is staffed by a team of 22 medical professionals and operates six days per week. From microsurgery and neurosurgery to ophthamology to maxillofacial surgery, the clinic provides routine and specialized medical care to approximately 20,000 people each year. Since 2002, the clinic has offered extensive services for cleft lip and cleft palate, free of charge to the families in need of those services.

Quito, Ecuador's capital, sits high in the Andean foothills. Chartered in 1980, the Quito los Olivos Lions Club has 29 members.

Recently, their clinic has seen an increase in the number of low-income expectant mothers seeking care. The private clinics in the area typically charge US\$30 to US\$50 for prenatal and maternity services, which is beyond the financial means of many residents. Consequently, more women are turning to the Quito los Olivos Medical Center for quality, acessible health care and family services.

To accommodate the increased demand, local Lions clubs built a second floor on the clinic to house a dedicated maternity ward. With the new space allocated and the professional expertise already on hand, all that was missing was the medical equipment.

Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) awarded a US\$59,043 Standard grant to the Lions of Ecuador to equip the new maternity clinic. Local Lions used these funds to purchase critical supplies such as an infant radiant warmer, a fetal monitor, newborn cribs, three electric hospital beds, a portable electrocardiograph machine, other diagnostic tools, a pediatric scale and birthing table.

"It is important to face life with a smile," says patient Laura Inés Rodríguez Zapater. "LCIF and the Quito los Olivos Lions Club have provided us with a reason to smile!"

The LCIF grant has substantially increased the amount of services the clinic can offer. The new maternity clinic now provides women of childbearing age with family planning education, health screenings, prenatal care, delivery and post-partum care. The clinic also offers vaccinations, nutritional counseling and therapeutic services for children. The addition of the maternity clinic means the Quito los Olivos Medical Center will now serve an expected 30,000 people each

year, which means healthier mothers, healthier families and a healthier community.

LCIF Standard grants provide matching funds from US\$10,000 to US\$100,000 to Lions clubs or districts that have identified a need within their community and have a plan to address that need. Projects must serve a large number of people and must be beyond the scope of traditional club and/or district fundraising activities. Standard grants generally provide capital funding for equipment and infrastructure needs. To learn about Standard grants, please visit lcif.org.

The highlight was the last one with Santa and his sleigh. Evan and his family joined Santa and Mrs. Claus and finished the rest of the parade route with Evan "flying high" with Santa.

The love and support for Evan and his family was felt throughout the crowd, and there weren't many dry

eyes, if any, that evening. A family member commented for Evan it truly was Christmas!

Austrians Mimic New York Event

AUSTRIA – Celebrating Lions Day at the United Nations, Lions in Austria held their own version of the day at the Parliament Building in Vienna. Lion *Karlheinz Kopf*, president of the Austrian National Council (one of the two houses in the Austrian Parliament), hosted the event.

Ambassadors, U.N. officials and Lions such as Kopf and Past International Director *Ernst Musil* talked about the long-standing relationship between the United Nations and Lions and the importance of nonprofit organizations in alleviating social ills. The keynoter was Prelate Mag. Fürnsinn, Abbot of the Herzogenburg Monastery. Classical musicians played songs by Mozart, Bach and Handel. The Peace Poster Contest finalists from the western, central and eastern districts of Austria were introduced to the crowd of 200.

Held in early spring in New York, Lions Day at the United Nations is a 37-year tradition.

The Fairest of Them All

FINLAND – Author Aleksis Kivi, who wrote the first significant novel in Finnish in the 18th century, knew and appreciated the fair held at Anianpelto. He wrote a poem about it: "Music was played and horse carriages drawn. Stallions proudly neighed. It was then that I saw this beautiful maiden, the young daughter of the county."

The fair was defunct for many years before the **Asikkala Lions Club** started it up again in 1970. Thousands come each summer for traditional food, goods sold by vendors, Finnish pastimes and activities such as a sauna and a wood chopping contest and, a highlight, the Miss Anianneito competition.

The theme for last year's fair was Exercising to Health. Runners competed in a race. Blood

pressure testing was available. Advocates for the local food movement bicycled to the fair to talk about their cause. Those in need were not forgotten: Lions donated the chopped wood for the competition to war veterans.

Foster Children Not Left Out

JAPAN – Shichi-go-san means "seven-five-three" in Japan. A traditional rite of passage for children of that age, the Shichi-go-san celebration is held on Nov. 15. The *Takasaki Lions Club* has made sure for 17 years that foster children take part in the cultural staple.

Lions arrange for children to be dressed in kimonos, tuxedos or dresses and then have their portraits taken. Last year 32 children from eight facilities in the Gunma Prefecture took part.

Lion *Hisao Yanai*, who ran a bridal dress and makeup company, started the project. His wife, Lion *Yayoi*, currently heads the company. Another member,

UKRAINE – When in Ukraine, do as the Kozaks do.

The *Kyiv Lions Club*, whose members include Americans, Spaniards, Germans and other expatriates working in Ukraine, hold a colorful Kozak Day. Kozak horsemen display their riding skills. Performers sing Ukrainian folk songs. Vendors sell crockery, clothing, metal work and salo (salted pig fat).

"The Kozaks represent the soul of the Ukrainian nation with their horsemanship, slightly rowdy behavior and valor combined with the ability to ride forever on only a piece of salo," says *Terry Pickard*, a member from England.

The event raised \$100,000 last year. "In our best year, our charitable events raised as much as \$300,000. In 10 years, we've given in excess of \$1 million to Ukrainian organizations," says Pickard.


Lions also have cleaned up beaches, painted and rehabbed orphanages and helped residents of "woefully inadequate nursing homes," says Pickard. The different nationalities of the club, which includes many Ukrainians, have numbered as many as 14. Meetings are in English.

Medals, Memories and Eyeglasses

Athletes from around the world paddled kayaks, spiked volleyballs and hit home runs at the 2015 Special Olympics World Games in Los Angeles this summer. Many returned home with more than medals and memories. They could see clearly for the first time in years after a screening and free eyeglasses. Or they could finally hear for the very first time after an exam and free hearing device. The Healthy Athletes program of Special Olympics screened nearly 80 percent of the 6,500 athletes. Lions helped staff the vision and hearing clinics at the University of Southern California. Many people with intellectual disabilities receive poor healthcare or no care, and Lions have partnered with Special Olympics for 15 years through the Opening Eyes program. The screenings at the Games led to magical moments that dwarfed in significance what happened in the pool or on the track. Six players on the Nigerian basketball team had never heard discernible sound, according to ESPN. They received hearing aids. When a 19-yearold center turned on her hearing aid for the first time, she smiled, laughed and then signed, "I hear sounds. I hear sounds."

The resort has a state-of-the-art dialysis unit on site (16 machines) in order to provide guests in renal failure with their dialysis three times a week. It also provides an excellent opportunity to experience the great outdoors; get back to nature; and enjoy a relaxing atmosphere away from the stresses of everyday life.

Lions Camp Dorset consists of 14 three bedroom cottages, fifteen efficiency units, all are fully equipped. Guests must bring their own bedding, towels, food and personal items. Also on the camp is a recreation hall, indoor swimming pool, tennis courts, mini golf, playground, lake and the Medical Centre.

Ontario Hospitals with Dialysis units each have a week at the camp every summer on a rotating basis. This family time is much appreciated and may be the only vacation that a person on dialysis may take. Mom, Dad, Grandma or Grandpa have their dialysis looked after at the Medical Centre with a full medical team while the rest of the family partakes in other activities at the camp. The common comment in our

books is " Thank you Lions family for making it possible to take a family vacation". This makes it all worthwhile doesn't it?

It takes many Lions family work parties and fundraisers by each club in Ontario to keep the camp





in good, safe condition. We strive to do one major repair project per year which takes much needed funds. We depend on you to continue supporting this very worthwhile Lions project and Thank-you for all your past support.

For Alyssa Clelland, CNIB's Lake Joseph Centre has always been about inclusion.

Born blind, the 17-year-old Kitchener resident has been benefitting from CNIB programs and services since she was learning to walk. Whether it was learning how to use a white cane, building orientation and mobility skills or accessing the library, CNIB has helped her navigate a world that's not always designed for someone living with vision loss.

Time at Lake Joe has boosted her confidence even higher.

After spending a week at Lake Joe every summer for the past decade, you'd be hard-pressed to find Alyssa anywhere other than on the water.

"She loves waterskiing, wakeboarding, tubing and swimming. She's had the opportunity to try activities she never would have experienced anywhere else," says Lion *Dawn Clelland,* Alyssa's mother and member of the *Kitchener Oktoberfest Lions Club*. "Kids who are blind are just as capable. They just need the opportunity."

And that's because Lake Joe is different.

The Muskoka camp is an accessible lakefront facility that provides a unique blend of recreation and vision rehabilitation. Kids who are blind or partially sighted are able to take part in activities like canoeing, hiking, horseback riding and swimming (as well as social programs and skills-training workshops that help them build their independence) in a safe, inclusive environment designed to support individuals

with vision loss.

For teens like Alyssa, it's a very special place – one where they can feel free to be themselves, socialize with others who live with vision loss and enjoy a traditional camp experience. At Lake Joe, Alyssa feels included and she's truly able to be herself. And, that 'self' is someone who loves everything that Lake Joe has to offer.

Lake Joe also offers peer support to parents and that's one of the reasons her family goes back every year.

"When you're raising a child who is blind, you're always working towards the next goal...from new life skills to accessibility issues to learning independence, there's always the next step to work towards," says Lion Dawn. "You don't always know what you're doing. Lake Joe provides a built-in group of families who are going through the same challenges you are. It helps put your child's progress in perspective and it can be refreshing to realize your child is really doing great."

Lion Dawn also appreciates the freedom that Lake Joe provides.

"When you're a parent of a child who is blind, you always have to be on, but Lake Joe is a place where you don't," says Lion Dawn. "Lake Joe is designed to enable independence in people who are blind or have low vision. I know Alyssa will be safe and included, no matter where she is, or what she is doing and that provides a sense of calm."

The Clelland family is hoping others will have an opportunity to experience the magic of Lake Joe. 




Lions Club of Kitchener


The Midland Lions Club Trophy was presented to a cadet in his fourth year of training who has excelled in all areas throughout the training year.
