

Kingsville Lions – ACE: Action for Climate Empowerment Art Competition

In late fall 2021, shortly after the Kingsville Lions Club Environment Committee decided to organize an art contest for local students, committee member Lion **Joe Gibson**, happened upon an international competition which had originated in Spain in 2019. This provided an excellent template for the eventual contest structure.

When the Lions Environment Committee approached Christine Goodchild, head of the Department of Arts and Humanities at Kingsville

Campaign 100: Empowering Service

The largest capital fundraising campaign in Foundation history launched in July 2017 with a goal to raise US\$300 million by June 2022.

Campaign 100 will enable the Foundation to empower the service of Lions for generations to come. As they have since 2017, Past International Presidents Dr. Jitsuhiko Yamada and J. Frank Moore III continue to lead the campaign at the international level as chairperson and vice chairperson, respectively.

The Need Continues

Fiscal year 2020-2021 began amid the COVID-19 pandemic and with prior year fundraising challenges continuing. Also underscoring the ongoing need for Campaign 100 were global issues beyond the pandemic. Natural disasters came like clockwork. Childhood cancers were diagnosed. Diabetes challenges continued, as did food insecurity, eye disease, environmental concerns, and issues facing youth.

With a focus on Lions' and Leos' ability to serve more meaningfully in both the near-term and coming decades, Campaign 100 will continue to: increase service impact, support the fight against diabetes, and advance global causes.

Providing Relief During Disaster

In 2020, the global health crisis caused by the COVID-19 pandemic was enough for anyone to bear. For some residents of Central America, it was only half the battle.

In early November 2020, Category 4 Hurricane Eta devastated parts of Central America. With torrential rainfall, winds peaking at 150 miles per hour, and catastrophic flooding, Eta was the most intense November Atlantic hurricane since 1932. That distinction, however, was not to last. Just two weeks after Eta wreaked havoc on the area, deadly Hurricane Iota made its way to land, sending residents into further despair.

Hurricanes Eta and Iota took hundreds of lives while leaving in their wake billions of dollars in damage. As they bore the weight of a deadly virus, children and families surviving the natural disasters were forced to battle more unfathomable challenges. Lions were there with storm victims in Costa Rica, Panama, Guatemala, and Honduras, delivering comfort and care. There with Lions was LCIF, providing US\$80,000 in Disaster grants for life-sustaining food, water tanks, cooktops, roof coverings, blankets, and cleaning supplies.



Navigating Diabetes at Camp Koala

Along Australia's southwest coast, just outside Melbourne, is beautiful Camp Wyuna, which each year provides fun in the sun for thousands of youth. Twenty-one of those, each with type 1 diabetes, had a unique camp experience thanks to Lions and LCIF.

With a US\$10,499 LCIF Diabetes grant, and in partnership with Australia-based Type1 Foundation, which connects medical practitioners and educators to newly diagnosed families, Lions facilitated Camp Koala. The camp helped teens

learn to manage their disease through classes on diet, insulin and glucose level management, and healthy lifestyle. Aware of challenges often accompanying adolescence, Lions also ensured the seven-day camp stressed independence, self-esteem, and emotional wellbeing, tapping six Type1 Foundation mentors – young adults with diabetes – to interact with campers peer-to-peer.

To further enhance the weeklong experience, campers also enjoyed activities including laser tag, a boat cruise, and adventure park exploration.


Said one Camp Koala participant, “I’ve met so many amazing people and friends. I’m so grateful I had the chance to attend. I can’t say thank you enough.”

Planting Hope for a Healthier World

With an eye to a healthier future for their community, themselves, and generations to come, Leos in Brescia Province of Italy took action to improve the city of Chiari and the health and well-being of those in the area – human and wildlife alike. Together, the young humanitarians created a tranquil forest to reduce smog and provide a peaceful and lush area for recreation and physical activity.

With a US\$2,500 LCIF Leo Service grant, and in collaboration with Lions and experts from the city’s agricultural institute, Leos designed the forest, selected the sapling provider, and determined tree species compatible with the local climate and terrain. Within three months of receiving grant approval, 35 Leos and Lions had planted the new, sustainable Leo and Lion Forest, 100 new trees breathing fresh air and hope into the city.

Generations to come will benefit from the forest, which serves as inspiration for other communities to be good stewards of the environment. Leos continue collaborating with Lions and the local municipality to raise additional funds to ensure project sustainability.



Feeding Souls in Seoul

Loved ones hospitalized. Lives lost. Milestone moments missed. Some devastation wrought by COVID-19 is easily quantified, readily apparent. Look deeper, however, and you find the less obvious fallout. That is exactly what Lions in Korea did, uncovering an unexpected consequence of the pandemic. A community desperate for food, no means to access it, and starved for emotional connection as well.

With the pandemic’s rise and lockdowns in place, homeless and seniors living near Seoul’s major rail station and in nearby jjokbang villages—areas of tiny one-room residences in low-income neighborhoods—were unable to travel to access free meal service. Compounding the problem? Volunteers normally delivering lifelines of food and companionship to the area’s most vulnerable rarely arrived. Quite literally, residents were starving.

Learning of the crises, Lions mobilized, using US\$7,058 in LCIF District and Club Community Impact grant funds to create boxed meals. In collaboration with, and sponsorship from, various local organizations, Lions sourced food for 500 meals, cooking, packaging, then delivering nourishing boxed lunches—and hope—to those in desperate need.



Identifying Needs, Delivering Solutions

Under the best of circumstances, waiting months for a child’s medical appointment can be frustrating. Enduring the actual visit evokes anxiety as well. During a pandemic, apprehension only compounds.

Serving a five-state area in the United States, the Minnesota Lions Children’s Hearing and ENT Clinic (LCHC) is a leader in diagnosing and treating children with ear, nose, and throat disorders.

Since opening roughly a decade ago, the clinic has seen audiology exam demand rise 20 percent. The challenge? Significantly longer wait times for appointments. The solution? LCIF and Lions.

With a US\$15,980 LCIF Matching grant, Lions purchased an additional sound booth and accompanying audiology equipment, expanding

the clinic’s capacity to serve an additional 1,000 patients annually, reducing appointment wait times, and providing a safer environment during the pandemic.

“This technology allows us to assess...in a fraction of the time it took with older technology,” said one LCHC audiologist. “With young children, having technology to check hearing devices, test hearing, and assess benefit all in one location – not switching rooms mid-appointment – makes a world of difference. And with increased infection control procedures needed due to COVID-19, our team is able to be more efficient with cleaning.”



Educating Future Educators

Social and emotional skills, knowledge, and attitudes are critical in both the classroom and in life. Helping students worldwide better navigate challenges in school, at home, and in the community is Lions Quest, LCIF’s premier social and emotional learning (SEL) program fostering schoolchildren’s ability to understand and manage emotions, set and achieve goals, feel and show empathy, build positive relationships, and make responsible decisions. Also critical to students’ social and emotional growth are teachers with their own highly developed and practiced SEL skills.

Recognizing the importance of SEL to its country’s future, Canada’s University of Lethbridge Faculty of Education ensured that more than 160 university students completing practicum coursework had access to Lions Quest SEL resources and lessons. The goal? Ensure future educators gain new SEL skills and knowledge to better support students’ social and emotional development, during elementary school teaching practicum experiences and beyond.



"Next generation teachers must keep students' social and emotional development top of mind," said Lion Lucy Johnson, Canada's District C-2 Lions Quest chairperson and a sessional seminar instructor at the university. "Well-adjusted and emotionally secure students are our country's and the world's path forward. Our future depends on our ability to develop these traits in students, and Lions Quest is imperative to helping children cope with academic and social stresses in school, at home, and as they make their way in the world."

Peace and Playtime for Children Battling Cancer

Fortunately, most youth will never experience the physical and emotional toll childhood cancer takes. Nor will their parents and families. Yet childhood cancer is the reality for many, including those seeking to regain health and set lives back on course at Taipei Medical University Hospital's Cancer Center.

To better serve pediatric cancer patients and families from Taipei and nearby areas, and to prepare for an expected increase in patients in the next five years, the Center constructed a new building. Though filled with advanced medical equipment and systems, something was missing. The new facility lacked a special space where young patients could leave cancer behind and enter a universe dedicated solely to the joys of childhood.

Expanding Access to Eye Care

In Zambia, the prevalence of blindness among all age groups is estimated to be 1 percent, meaning in the southern Luapula province approximately 7,400 people are blind. According to Zambia's Ministry of Health, more than 80 percent of all cases of blindness in the country are preventable, treatable, curable. Why then the devastating rate of blindness? The answer lies in historically limited eye disease identification and eye care treatment.

With a goal to reduce avoidable blindness a staggering 51 percent before 2025, and with

Enter LCIF and Lions. Recognizing a need to heal both body and mind, Lions applied US\$150,000 in LCIF Childhood Cancer grant funds, as well as US\$220,000 raised locally, to help construct a child-focused area within Taipei Cancer Center's new building. The space, which includes a playground, reading area, and multimedia equipment, helps young patients' imaginations and spirits soar and parents and caretakers set aside worry and stress wrought by a devastating childhood disease.

a US\$606,667 LCIF SightFirst grant, Lions in Zambia and local partners began a five-year endeavor to expand access to primary eye care and cataract surgical services in southern Luapula. Grant funds are helping renovate and equip primary eye units, build human resource capacity, and establish a mobile outreach program.

In year one, LCIF grant funds have been instrumental in training community health workers to identify cases of cataract; screening nearly 19,000 residents for various eye conditions; and delivering more than 250 cataract surgeries to improve or restore sight.

Trustee Oswal dedicates life to serving from the heart

More than 30 years ago, Trustee Aruna Abhey Oswal joined her local Lions club in Mumbai, India. As a humanitarian and changemaker, she wanted to expand her service globally to help create a better world and empower others.

Early on, Trustee Oswal established herself as a trailblazer within the Lions Clubs by becoming the first woman president of the Lions Club of Juhu and the first woman district governor of District 323A in India. She also served as multiple district coordinator for LCIF's Campaign SightFirst II, LCIF multiple district coordinator, international director, and trustee of Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF).

Now in 2022, Trustee Oswal reflects on helping thousands of families by supporting global projects including vision, Special Olympics, childhood cancer, and women's empowerment. With every project, she hopes to bring tears of joy to families and create a better life for others.

To magnify her impact, Trustee Oswal created a foundation, the Aruna Abhey Oswal Trust, with her late husband, Shri Abhay Oswal. In partnership with her foundation and LCIF, recent projects include a pediatric care center in Paraguay, an all-inclusive playground at the childhood cancer ward in Malawi, and a new ophthalmology wing in India, to name a few.

In celebration of the end of the Campaign 100 and International Women's Day last month, Trustee Oswal reflected with LCIF on her commitment to the organization, the importance of Campaign 100, and how she empowers women throughout the world.

Q: In 1989, you decided to join the Lions Club. Why did you start volunteering as a Lion?

Trustee Oswal: We are all human beings, and we wanted to do something good for society, not only in India, but Mr. Oswal wanted to serve

globally. In my service journey, Mr. Oswal played a very important role to help provide the resources and platform where I can go and serve the community at large. We chose LCIF because we wanted to reach our fellow man and expand our global impact.

Q: Why is Campaign 100 so important for the future of the organization? Why do you think it is important to inspire gifts to LCIF and the campaign, no matter the size?

Trustee Oswal: Campaign 100 will give us the ability to support service for years to come, and this is so important for LCIF. Success in reaching our campaign goal is going to happen with the involvement of our Lions. Our Lions should feel like they are part of the campaign, and part of this success story. I never tell Lions to donate thousands and thousands of dollars. I always tell them to start with small amounts because every drop fills the ocean.

Q: As a trailblazer, why do you think it is important to inspire women members to participate and give to the Lions Club?

Trustee Oswal: I always tell women at the Lions Club that we have great examples in front of us from Past International President Gudrun Yngvadottir and International Second Vice President Dr. Patti Hill. The time is now for women.

I assure women that they can do wonders, and we can do something different. Women have special qualities as multi-taskers, and we can be changemakers if given the opportunity. If a woman is capable, positive, inspiring, motivating, service-oriented, and humble, please consider her for the Lions. We need women as leaders, and they can change the world.

Q: Last month, the world celebrated International Women's Day on March 8 to recognize the social, political, and economic achievements of women. Why is women's empowerment important to you, and how do you inspire other women?

Trustee Oswal: In my life, I was empowered by my family and my husband. I decided, if I can be empowered by my family, I should empower other women.

I'm empowering so many women in my office, in my family, and wherever I go. Women can do

anything if they are given the confidence, power, and the respect. Women are in every field from police officers to astronauts to corporate business professionals; we are everywhere.

Right now, I'm leading a women's empowerment committee in India and helping women upgrade their lives and their businesses. In the past as a Lion, one of my favorite projects was helping secure 1,000 sewing machines and certifications for women in India to help women provide for their families.

Q: Throughout the last 30 years, what accomplishments as a Lion are you most proud of?

Trustee Oswal: I love the projects for women's empowerment, any project supporting children, and Special Olympics. All the projects are very close to my heart. If service is needed, I am for it. Whatever the need is, we are there.

Q: On your foundation's website, you said, "One's true happiness can be achieved by the happiness of others." Why is the quote important to you? How do you try to live by this quote in your life?

Trustee Oswal: I always remember Mother Teresa's quote, "the world is full of good people if you can't find one, be one." You can be the one. You can bring a smile to one person. If you can help one person a day, in a year, you will help 365 people. If you give food to a hungry man, you can feel how he is feeling fulfilled and see the tears of joy, which I have seen so many times throughout my 45 years of service to the world.

My late husband said, "if you do something for humanity, the whole world will salute you. This is what I want in my life. If you die, die with some

Rebuilding communities in Kerala after devastating floods

LCIF

The people of Kerala, India are accustomed to wet seasons, but 2018's monsoons brought catastrophic rains and the worst flooding in 100 years. Rising water rushed through communities, destroying everything in its path, including the peaceful way of life for more than one million people.

Roads collapsed under the weight of the water, coconut trees uprooted from saturated soil, and homes became fully submerged. Nearly 500 people lost their lives, and more than 16,000 homes were destroyed.

"We lost everything," said Mr. Vareeth, one flood victim. "We lost our house and all our belongings."

Lions in Kerala—almost 25,000 strong—quickly mobilized to help their neighbors with support from the Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF). Within days after the flooding, LCIF awarded a US\$100,000 Major Catastrophe grant to rebuild homes in the Lions' communities.

Now in 2022, because of Lions' efforts and LCIF support, 97 families live in newly constructed homes throughout the state of Kerala.

"All of us sprang into action to help the people who were suffering from the floods and landslides," said Past International Director (PID) Ratnaswamy Murugan, grant administrator.

Creating an even larger impact on recovery, LCIF awarded an additional US\$560,000 grant for the project, and the Manappuram Foundation donated US\$210,000 to support the construction of 120 homes. To date, 97 homes are completed, and the remaining 23 homes will be completed in the Spring of 2022.

"After the flooding, the Manappuram Foundation wanted to help our community rebuild, and, and we decided to join efforts with LCIF to help more families," said International Director V.P. Nandakumar, Managing Trustee of Manappuram Foundation.

The reconstruction project started in March 2020, but the COVID-19 pandemic delayed the project for 10 months. Families throughout the


state of Kerala, which spans more than 310 miles, moved into the homes throughout region in the last two years.

"Even in my dreams, I never imagined that I would get a house like this," said Aliakutty, a Kerala resident and flood victim. "I am grateful, and thankful to the club members."



The 400 square feet homes constructed include 96 independent homes, 12 apartments, and 12 colony homes. Each home includes cement, concrete roof, ceramic tiles for flooring, toilet, kitchen, electrical wiring, and a shower area.

"The project is the first time in the last 50 years' history of our multiple districts that a mega housing project was executed," PID Murugan said.



"Every home displays a Lions' emblem, and these will remain as permanent testimony of the service rendered by Lions in this part of the world in the State of Kerala, India."

The partnership between LCIF and the Manappuram Foundation built a sustainable future for Kerala families including Vareeth and his family, who now live in one of the homes. "It was the Lions club," he said. "They came and constructed that house for us."

Like Vareeth, the 2018 floods impacted Beena Rajesh, who lost her husband to a flood-related accident. "I am thankful for LCIF and the Manappuram Foundation for the home they constructed for us where I am living now with my two children," she said.

With Manappuram's support, 30 homes were built. The Lions throughout the region also rebuilt 102 homes after the devastation from 2018-2020.

When War Came, Lions Followed

Getting aid to those who need it

When news hit in late February that Russia had attacked Ukraine, Lions in surrounding countries knew they had to act.

"Lions can't stand by without taking action," says Marina Sabini, a member of Lions Club Asti, storici, artisti e presepisti in Asti, Italy. "This is what we thought," she says. "But we waited a few days to understand how to best intervene and help where there was real need." They also waited for Lions in Romania, who they had partnered with to bring back information. "We wanted to know how and where to best help," says Sabini.

Lions Club Emeritus Brasov in Brasov, Romania, had rented and was managing a facility to house a group of refugees made up of 62 women and children and four men who are fathers of children with serious health problems.

The refugees, who had left with only what they could carry and with no idea of when or if they would be able to return home, were in desperate need of all sorts of resources for daily living, from eyeglasses to clothing to medicine and food.

The 30-member Asti club, along with the help of several other Italian clubs, began collecting the needed items including 2,400 pairs of eyeglasses and sunglasses for adults and children, 1284 kilograms (nearly 3,000 pounds) of humanitarian aid consisting of medicine, personal hygiene products, winter clothing, blankets, toys, canned food, and cash donations.



Lions packed a van with the donated items and traveled 3,780 kilometers (about 2,350 miles) to deliver the resources to Lions in Romania.

"The volunteers stopped there for two days to get to know and talk to the refugees and to buy food vouchers that will be used for the next months," Sabini says.

The center provides ensuite rooms for four people, a shared kitchen, a computer room for online classes, a game room, living room, and dining room. Romanian Lions also are assisting with providing medical care, psychological support, and recreational and sports activities for the children.

The visiting Lions from Asti soon learned that the center needed a refrigerator and two food processors, which they purchased and donated on the spot.

"Every day it is necessary to feed around 70 people, including refugees and volunteers, which implies the need for a large and functional kitchen," Sabini says.

The Lions also took time to meet the refugees and to play with the little ones.



"We brought some toys for the children who welcomed us with big hugs and affection," she says. "We played with them for a long time, hoping to distract them for a few hours from their problems and the distance from their country and their fathers."

Sabini described meeting the refugees as a "strong and wonderful experience."

She says everyone, whether they prepared packages, loaded the van, or traveled to deliver the donations and meet refugees in person, did so with the hope that they would be able to provide meaningful help to the refugees.

"We also realized how important and rewarding it is to help others," she says, "and how much this fills your heart with joy."

From Ukraine by Bus to Portugal Lions send help to women and children fleeing Russian invasion by Joan Cary

Just weeks after Russia invaded Ukraine on Feb. 24, 2022, the Braga Lions in Portugal knew they could not remain indifferent to daily reports of devastation and human suffering.

Planning quickly and meticulously, in three weeks' time they sent a bus equipped with food and water, clothes, and medicines, 4,000 km (2,485 miles) to Ukraine. Forty-four women and children with their few personal items as well as their beloved pets boarded the bus headed back to Braga where they were welcomed into safe homes and given food, clothing, and much needed friendship.

At the same time, the Braga Lions sent a truckload of essential items to Poland to assist the people still in Ukraine.

“Never has this motto – We Serve – made more sense,” says PDG Paulo Rodrigues in Braga.

Lions worked with the support of the Braga City Hall, a local transportation company, and a water treatment company. “Nothing was left to chance,” says Rodrigues of the bus trip. Only those with knowledge and skills that could help their guests, including a

medical doctor and people trained in psychology, were allowed to accompany the Ukrainians on the trip.

Meanwhile, in Krasnik, Poland, the Warszawa Arka Lions received the truckful of medicine and clothing from Braga at a warehouse donated by a man from Canada. There along the border, the Lions collected the goods received from various countries (Portugal, Lithuania, France, Canada, Denmark, Poland), and with the help of non-Lions export these needed items to their Lion friends in Lviv and Kiev, Ukraine,

to distribute further, says Lion Hanna Sobiech.



District A-5 Convention



After three years of not meeting in person, our first post-Covid convention was held. The theme was NASCAR. Yes, Nascar, DG **Carmen** is a big fan.







A large thank you to the band "Shadowz" for their outstanding music as they had everyone rocking


in their seats. Thank you to all of our dedicated sponsors and Lion's Club Members who committed numerous volunteer hours this event.

Vienna Lions Club

"There Is No Joy in This"

In a January 2022 CTV news article, written by Brent Lake of CTV News London, the author summarized the Municipality of Bayham's town council's rational for discontinuing support of the Vienna and Lions Community Center.

According to the current club secretary **William Gheysen**, since significant travel was required to host weddings and other functions, a united community came together to build The Vienna Community Center (VCC) and Lions Club meeting place. The VCC opened in 1964.

Funding to build the center came from Department of Agriculture grants, the donation of property by the local school board and local fundraising by the Lions Club. Community Reeve K.C. Emmerson donated his salary from 1963 to 1973 to assist the building fund.


For over 50 years the Lions Club of Vienna contributed annually to the operation and maintenance of the facility. The club funded the monthly ball park hydro bills, supplied furniture, renovated the basement's Lions Den, built storage areas and added a large accessible downstairs washroom.

After being shuttered by Covid 19 for 2 years and with a unanimous vote, council voted to sell the building.

That vote occurred after council received from the small community's residents over 2,000 signatures and 110 comments supporting continued municipal support of the Vienna Community Centre: there was no joy in Vienna!

Following the vote by municipal council, the VCC was placed up for sale. Soon after and with the support of 26 new members, the Lions obtained a mortgage and purchased the Vienna Lions Club Community Centre, completing a mission to repurchase what they helped to build and maintain over the past 50 years.





Port Colborne Lions Club 100 Years of Service

The Port Colborne Lions celebrated their 100th year of service by holding a 100TH ANNIVERSARY HOME APPLIANCE DRAW! The draw valued at up to \$10,000 includes a fridge, stove, dishwasher, microwave oven, washer, and dryer. Leading up to the October 29th draw there will be five early bird cash draws of \$100.00 to \$500.00.

100th Year Club Budget: Earlier this Lions year, the Port Colborne Lions approved their 2021-22 budget with expected spending of \$7,000 for the youth of Port Colborne, over \$11,000 for the community of Port Colborne, \$1,200 for Lions Camps supporting youth with cancer, diabetes, vision impairment or requiring dialysis while at camp and \$7,250 for various Lions projects. Due to the generous support from the Port Colborne community, the club is well on their way to achieve their goals. To date, \$5,200 has been contributed to support minor soccer, minor baseball, the Navy League, Boy Scouts, Girl Guides, girls' hockey association, PC Conservation Club children's fishing derby, children's summer program at the PC Library, as well as scholarships at both Lakeshore Catholic and Port Colborne High Schools.

For the community of Port Colborne, the club supported the Legion's Remembrance Day celebrations, the PC food drive, Niagara Children's Centre, Port Cares, PC meals on wheels, and Woman's Place. In addition, the club has committed \$10,000 for new park benches at H.H. Knoll Park as well as a Lions Arch at Lions field to commemorate the clubs bond with the community.

During the PC Lions 100th year of service the club organized a food drive for Port Cares, that realized a collection of 26,867 lbs of groceries as well as \$7,548 in cash. Due to the urgent need, the club's funding of Lions Clubs International Global Projects exceeded club budget projections in 3 specific areas: \$2,000 to assist flooding in both western and eastern Canada; \$2,000 to assist those in Ukraine who have been displaced from their homes because of the Russian conflict; and the first of two \$3,000 installments to the Lions of Canada Vision Dog Guide Program.

The year 2022 marks the 100th anniversary of the Port Colborne Lions Club. It also marks the return of our annual Walk-A-Dog in support of Dog Guides of Canada in May and the club's annual carnival scheduled for July 21-24th followed by Port Colborne's Canal Days celebrations July 29 through August 1st.
