The following proposed amendments to the International Constitution and By-Laws will be reported to the delegates for vote at the 2023 International Convention.



ITEM 1:

A RESOLUTION TO REMOVE THE MINIMUM DISTRICT REQUIREMENTS FROM THE THIRD VICE PRESIDENT QUALIFICATIONS. REMOVAL OF THIS REQUIREMENT WILL PERMIT QUALIFIED CANDIDATES FROM ANY DISTRICT TO CONTEST FOR THE OFFICE, PROVIDED ALL OTHER QUALIFICATIONS ARE MET. (THIS AMENDMENT TO THE BY-LAWS REQUIRES A MAJORITY VOTE TO ADOPT)

SHALL THE FOLLOWING RESOLUTION BE ADOPTED?

BE IT RESOLVED, That the International By-Laws, Article II, Section 2(a)(3) be removed in its entirety, and all subsequent sections be renumbered accordingly.

ITEM 2:

A RESOLUTION TO REMOVE THE MINIMUM DISTRICT REQUIREMENTS FROM THE INTERNATIONAL DIRECTOR QUALIFICATIONS. REMOVAL OF THIS REQUIREMENT WILL PERMIT QUALIFIED CANDIDATES FROM ANY DISTRICT, INCLUDING TRANSITIONAL AND PROVISIONAL DISTRICTS, TO CONTEST FOR THE OFFICE, PROVIDED ALL OTHER QUALIFICATIONS ARE MET.

(THIS AMENDMENT TO THE BY-LAWS REQUIRES A MAJORITY VOTE TO ADOPT)
SHALL THE FOLLOWING RESOLUTION BE ADOPTED?

BE IT RESOLVED, That the International By-Laws, Article II, Section 3(c) be removed in its entirety, and all subsequent sections be renumbered accordingly.

ITEM 3:

A RESOLUTION TO CREATE A DISTINCT MEMBERSHIPCATEGORY FOR MEMBERS PAYING DISCOUNTED DUES AS A RESULT OF ANY DISCOUNT PROGRAM OFFERED BY THE ASSOCIATION. CREATION OF A NEW CATEGORY WILL PREVENT MEMBERS PAYING DISCOUNTED DUES FROM INCREASING A CLUB'S TOTAL DELEGATE ENTITLEMENT AT A DISTRICT, MULTIPLE DISTRICT OR INTERNATIONAL CONVENTION. (THIS AMENDMENT TO THE BY-LAWS REQUIRES A MAJORITY VOTE TO ADOPT)

SHALL THE FOLLOWING RESOLUTION BE ADOPTED?

BE IT RESOLVED, That the International By- Laws, Article XI, Section 7 be amended to include "Discounted" between "Associate," and "Honorary," to become effective January 1, 2024.

ITFM 4

A RESOLUTION TO UPDATE THE DUTIES OF DISTRICT OFFICERS. AMENDMENT OF THE DUTIES WILL ALIGN WITH A FOCUS ON MEMBERSHIP GROWTH AND LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT MOVING FORWARD. (THIS AMENDMENT TO THE BY-LAWS REQUIRES A MAJORITY VOTE TO ADOPT)

SHALL THE FOLLOWING RESOLUTION BE ADOPTED?

BE IT RESOLVED, That Article X, Section 2(a) of the International By-Laws be amended by deleting the existing language in its entirety and substituting the following:

As an international officer of this association, and under the general supervision of the International Board of Directors, they shall represent the association in their district. In addition, they shall be the chief administrative officer in their district and shall have direct supervision over the district cabinet. Their specific responsibilities shall be to:

(1) Further the purposes of this association resulting in membership growth in the district. (2) Oversee the Global Action Team at the district level and inspire other district officers to actively support membership growth and new club organization.

- (3) Oversee current district action plan focused on and working towards the successful achievement of district goals to
- a. Charter new clubs.
- b. Achieve net membership growth.
- c. Ensure effective club operations.
- d. Provide leadership development and skills training at the club and district levels.
- e. Encourage clubs to conduct and report meaningful humanitarian service.
- f. Support and promote Lions Clubs International Foundation and encourage club and member contributions to Lions Clubs International Foundation.
- (4) Oversee the administrative operations of the district as provided in the Standard District Bylaws
- (5) Guide clubs to operate in accordance with International Constitution and By-Laws, support activities that improve member retention and remain in good standing with the association.
- (6) Preside, when present, over the district convention, and cabinet and other district meetings.
- (7) Perform such other functions as required by the International Board of Directors.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That Article X, Section 2(b) of the International By-Laws be amended by deleting the existing language in its entirety and substituting the following:

The first vice district governor, subject to the supervision and direction of the district governor, shall be chief administrative assistant to the district governor. Their specific responsibilities shall be to:

- (1) Further the purposes of this association resulting in membership growth in the district.
- (2) Actively work toward the success of the current district action plan.
- (3) With the district governor and second vice district governor, review strengths and weaknesses of the district; refine and further develop a draft of the ongoing district plan focused on and working towards the successful achievement of district goals.
- (4) Identify and prepare a highly effective team for the subsequent year to develop and implement action plans to achieve district goals.
- (5) Work closely with the club leadership to identify future district leaders.
- (6) Perform such duties and other directives as may be assigned by the district governor

- or the policies established by the International Board of Directors.
- (7) At the request of the district governor, supervise appropriate district committees.
- (8) Actively participate in all cabinet meetings and conduct all meetings in the absence of the district governor.
- (9) Participate in council of governors' meetings as appropriate.
- (10) Participate in the preparation of the district budget.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That Article X, Section 2(c) of the International By-Laws be amended by deleting the existing language in its entirety and substituting the following:

The second vice district governor is subject to the supervision and direction of the district governor. Their specific responsibilities shall be to:

- (1) Further the purposes of this association resulting in membership growth in the district.
- (2) Actively work towards the success of the current district action plan.
- (3) Serve as the district liaison to region and zone chairpersons, at the direction of the district governor, working towards successful region and zone operations in support of club health.
- (4) Become familiar with resources to support club development
- (5) Prepare for the role of district governor.
- (6) Perform such duties and other directives as assigned by the district governor or the policies established by the International Board of Directors.
- (7) At the request of the district governor, supervise appropriate district committees.
- (8) Actively participate in all cabinet meetings and conduct all meetings in the absence of the district governor and the first vice district governor
- (9) Participate in the preparation of the district budget.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That Article X, Section 2(d) of the International By-Laws be amended by deleting the existing language in its entirety and substituting the following:

The region chairperson, if the position is utilized during the district governor's term, is subject to the supervision and direction of the district governor and shall be the chief administrative officer in their region. Their specific responsibilities shall be to:

- (1) Further the purposes of this association resulting in membership growth in the district.
- (2) Actively work towards the success of the current district action plan and encourage club and zone participation.
- (3) Supervise the activities of the zone chairpersons in their region and such district committee chairperson(s) as may be assigned by the district governor.
- (4) Support club health by identifying club strengths and weaknesses and encouraging growth, leadership excellence and meaningful service.
- (5) Become familiar with district operation and enhance leadership skills as needed for advancement.
- (6) Perform such duties and directives as may be required by the district officers or policies established by the International Board of Directors.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED. That

Article X, Section 2(e) of the International By-Laws be amended by deleting the existing language in its entirety and substituting the following:

The zone chairperson, subject to the supervision and direction of the district governor and/or region chairperson, shall be the chief administrative officer in their zone. Their specific responsibilities shall be to:

- (1) Further the purposes of this association resulting in membership growth in the district.
- (2) Actively work towards the success of the current district action plan and encourage club participation.
- (3) Serve as chairperson of the district governor's advisory committee in their zone and as such chairperson to call regular meetings of said committee.
- (4) Ensure club health by identifying club strengths and weaknesses and encouraging growth, leadership excellence and meaningful service.
- (5) Become familiar with district operations and enhance leadership skills as needed for advancement.
- (6) Perform such other functions and acts as may be required by the International Board of Directors through the district officer's manual and other directives.

Lions Respond to 'Disaster of the Century' With LCIF Support

"Turkey is going through the most difficult days in its history," says Past Council Chairperson Danyal Kubin, the disaster relief committee chairperson for MD 118 who is mobilizing Lions' disaster relief efforts following the February 2023 earthquake and aftershocks that struck Turkey and Syria.

Kubin is a structural engineer and seismic expert. He says this series of earthquakes is the largest seen in the region in more than a century and were felt for more than 350,000 square kilometers. Additionally, the earthquakes were very close to the surface, making the destruction even greater.

To date, the disaster has killed more than 50,000 people, injured more than 120,000, and left millions of people displaced. Homes crumbled to the ground, hundreds of other buildings collapsed, and communities were changed forever.

"Although our state and non-government associations do their best to support the earthquake zone with all their power, unfortunately, it is not enough to overcome all the problems caused by these earthquakes," Kubin said.

When a humanitarian disaster of this magnitude strikes, Lions are among the first to respond. And, empowered by Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) grant funds, they are already bringing a small bit of comfort to survivors of these devastating earthquakes.

The first priority? Providing safety and shelter to people who currently have no place to call

home.

Immediately after the first earthquake struck, LCIF awarded a US\$200,000 Major Catastrophe Grant to the Lions in Turkey. Lions are using these funds to develop the Adiyaman Lions Container Village. The 60 containers purchased with the grant are furnished and fitted with a kitchen and bathroom to provide temporary housing for displaced people while they await reconstruction in their communities.

Lions in Sweden also are using an LCIF Matching Grant awarded in May 2022 to develop the Antakya Lions Tent Village. Within the village are 320 tents to temporarily house 1,050 people, more than 340 of them children. Local Lions and Leo volunteers regularly interact with the children, providing them with learning and socialization opportunities.

Finally, through LCIF's partnership with the MD 111 German Lions Foundation, funds are addressing the immediate survival, safety, and short-term housing needs of victims of the earthquakes in Turkey and Syria.

These are just a few of the projects that are underway. Additional grants will be awarded as needs continue to grow.

"The devastation that this earthquake and the subsequent aftershocks brought is heartbreaking, and those affected by this disaster will need support in recovering and rebuilding for many days, weeks, months, and even years ahead," said LCIF Chairperson Douglas X. Alexander.

"The response and support from Lions worldwide is inspiring and illustrates Lions' unwavering humanitarian spirit during this unfathomable disaster. Lions live and serve in the communities most impacted, and we will be there to support the people there as long as they need us," Alexander added. "LCIF grant funding helps us make an even bigger difference

for people who've experienced so much loss during this unimaginable disaster."

LCIF grants are only possible with support from Lions across the globe, who immediately united to support those impacted by the earthquakes. In the weeks following the disaster, many Lions leaders, clubs and districts launched fundraising events in person and online to benefit LCIF's Disaster Relief fund. Lions worldwide also continue to make individual donations to support the cause. These efforts will help ensure that Lions can provide help and hope in the region as long as it is needed.

"We are talking about a disaster on a scale that no country in the world can be prepared for on its own," Kubin said. "That's why we need the support of the international community more than ever. Together we are always stronger."

District A5 Convention

The convention had several displays and vendors including the A5 Historian Pin Project, LCIF, Lions Quest, and the Hearing chair. One special display and sale was donated by the late PDG Lion **Grace Kingsnorth**, our long time LCIF chair until the past few years. Before she passed, she had donated all of her Lions jewellery to be sold at the convention

and the proceeds given to LCIF. Approximately \$500.00 was raised. Lion Grace was a strong supporter of LCIF and we are grateful for this wonderful gesture.

There were several sessions that Lions could attend, including an unusual one from a group that crochets "Princess" wigs for children with cancer. Another booth was set up by S.A.B.I.C.(Seizure and Brain Injury Centre) in Timmins.

This was a DG's's project to raise money to expand services in Northern Ontario. A5 raised \$20,844.70 to support S.A.B.I.C.

Saturday evening was filled with laughter and speeches by PID Tom Gordon and the District





Governor. The hospitality rooms were popular for many hours. Sunday brought our memorial service and closing ceremony. Although we had 181 new members this year (our largest growth in decades), we lost 131 to death and other reasons. This included several PDGs, whom we will miss dearly.

Partnerships with Purpose

"When you remove a cataract, people who have not seen their children in years, suddenly see them. It is amazing to witness," Past District Governor Sedrace Rwekikiya shared, while standing under the thick shade of the tree canopy just outside St. Francis Nsambya Hospital in Kampala, Uganda. As she continued to speak about the incredible impact Lions have made in Uganda toward reducing preventable blindness, in the distance, the latest vision project was taking shape.

A renovated and expanded two-story vision clinic surrounded by scaffolding could be seen past the trees. This 5,500 sq foot facility, expected to be completed in 2024, should provide enough space and equipment for medical staff to increase outpatient consultations from 2,800 to 8,100 per year. Newly trained staff will also increase the diagnosis and treatment capacity by thousands of individuals.

"I am excited about the new clinic being constructed," Dr. Lucy Namakula expressed with a smile. "This will extend our services to the community and save our patients money." Earlier in the day, she had to refer a family to another hospital because their baby had severely crossed eyes and the current vision clinic could not manage his treatment. This referral to a larger facility would require travel for the family, which would increase their costs. "It is important to support the clinic because sight is a gift. This clinic will save families money and the new equipment will improve our patient care, so we are grateful to Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) and Latter-day Saint Charities for supporting us."

it is expected to offer 20,250 student eye exams each year, in addition to exponentially increasing the current clinic's capacity for cataract surgeries, diabetic retinopathy screenings, and more.

For years, Kampala has had few comprehensive eye care facilities and they were not meeting the full needs of the community. Knowing this, Dr. Geoffrey Erem and fellow Lions of District 411-B decided they could bridge the gap by applying

for a SightFirst grant with LCIF to expand and improve their current vision clinic. "Lions come together to solve community needs," Dr. Erem noted. "If we pool resources, we make a larger difference."

Efforts like this one prove Dr. Erem's point. The mission-oriented partnership with Latterday Saint Charities will enhance LCIF's ability to invest in vision care in expansive ways, support sustainable Lions-led projects, and reach thousands of people in Kampala. Additionally, for the medical professionals who will be empowered to serve a greater number of patients more effectively, this partnership will support their professional fulfillment, which is immeasurable yet priceless. "I love to help patients see," Dr. Namakula remarked. "It is like



a bit of magic. Just imagine that you have been living in darkness and now there is light."

When the doors to the newly expanded St. Francis Nsambya Hospital Eye Clinic open next year, light will flood each room and patients will leave with the ability to see it, some for the first time.

LCIF and Latter-day Saint Charities have partnered since 2018 to fight the major causes of preventable and reversible blindness for underserved populations in Africa, South America, and the Middle East. MEET LION JUDGE KEVIN BISHOP, ONE OF MANY LIONS HELPING AFTER DISASTER STRIKES

After a devastating tornado hit his community in Mayfield, Kentucky, USA, Lion Judge Kevin Bishop turned to LCIF for help.

The tornado that hit Mayfield was one of a series of tornadoes that ripped through homes and businesses, pulled powerlines straight from the ground, and spread debris for miles around—leaving destruction in their wake.

LCIF immediately awarded an Emergency Grant to the Lions in Kentucky. The grant funds supported generators, propane heaters, and carbon monoxide detectors. Many of the power lines were damaged from the tornadoes and leaving families without power.

Beyond the immediate help, LCIF also awarded an additional grant to District 43-K to purchase equipment for the Mayfield Graves County Fire Department and Rescue Squad Station. The tornado destroyed the building, and although the rescue squad did have insurance, it was not enough to cover all equipment lost.

In addition to LCIF's support, Lions across the country in Pennsylvania, Oregon, Ohio, New York, and Connecticut delivered supplies in the days following the disaster.

"I have been a Lion for a long time and our motto is that 'we serve,' but until the Lions serve your community, you don't know what these words really mean," Bishop said.

HELPING YOUTH IN ECUADOR

In Quito, Ecuador, LCIF's Lions Quest program helps provide a sense of community and belonging to youth at the Colegio Alemán Quito school.

The school began implementing the program in the 2014-2015 school year. Through social and emotional learning curriculum, the Lions Quest program strengthens key social and personal skills and prevents behavior that is harmful to children and others. Lions Quest encourages self-awareness and self-efficacy so that children and young people can make positive decisions.

"At Lions Quest, I learned that all my friends should be part of a team. They all help each other," said Ivanna, a student at Colegio Alemán Ouito School.

Isaac Abad Crespo, past council chairperson and District G-1 Lions Quest chairperson, helped the school adopt the program. In 2019, an LCIF Community Partnership grant was awarded to District G-1 to help the school pilot the newest edition of the program and expand Lions Quest activities at the school, adding Skills for Adolescence. The program



helps children and adults manage emotions; set and achieve goals; and feel and show empathy for others, helping them establish positive relationships and make responsible decisions.

"I think that for us parents, it is an important tool that helps in the socio-emotional development of our children," said Carolina Dominguez, a parent. "My children use many strategies from Lions Quest to talk and resolve conflicts."

Gabriela Reyes, a teacher at the school and Lions Quest coordinator, said she noticed a difference in children's listening between ages eight and nine. For example, several children gave examples of different situations in which they did not feel heard—especially at home. One girl said she realized that she didn't listen in the right way to her parents when they wanted to talk to her, Reyes said.



"If you start working with children on the acquisition of social and emotional skills at an early age, I believe that we will have children who positively impact the community to which they belong," Reyes said. Reyes and Crespo are looking forward to seeing the continued impact that the program has on youth. "Our motto is to serve. I think one of the best ways to serve our community is to adopt this program because you can see extraordinary results in the children and youth, and they are our future," Crespo said.

HUNGRY TO HOPEFUL

Throughout the world, many children wake up and go to bed hungry each day. In India, two in five children face malnutrition, which can lead to illness, stunting, and delayed physical activity.

Supporting rural children in India who face food insecurity are the Anganwadis—government-run childcare centers that combat hunger and malnutrition for children ages six and under. The program was started by the Indian government in 1975 as part of the Integrated

Child Development and Services program, but unfortunately, some of the centers lacked hygienic kitchen and dining facilities.

With support of an LCIF US\$84,225 Hunger grant, Lions refurbished the kitchen and dining facilities in 90 Anganwadis throughout the state of Kerala.

"We Lions recognized the need to improve the dilapidated kitchen and dining facilities of at least a few Anganwadis," said Past District Governor Rajesh Kolarikkal, grant administrator for the project.

Lions renovated kitchens with stainless steel countertops and sinks, replaced plumbing, added worktables with stovetops and installed refrigerators—all to ensure that children can eat healthy food. They also installed stainless steel dining tables and benches in the dining rooms

for ease of cleaning and increased sanitation.

More than 900 Lions installed the upgraded equipment, and helped monitor the facilities to ensure everything functions properly.

"The most modern and hygienic equipment—along with a refrigerator—were unimaginable to these centers without your support," said V.P. Sajeendran, Kerala legislative member from

Kunnathunadu. "I appreciate LCIF for enabling Lions to implement such a project, which is a dire need of the community."

The 2,250 children, who depend on the Anganwadis each year, are now able to enjoy healthy meals cooked in a hygienic environment.

And parents and teachers can rest assured that their children will learn and thrive in a safe, nurturing environment. As Kolarikkal said, "Wherever there is a need, there is a Lion."

EMPOWERING AND GUIDING THOSE LIVING WITH DIABETES

Diabetes educators empower people to manage their diabetes by coaching and guiding patients to understand the chronic disease and how it affects their personal lives and work.

Thanks to funds from LCIF and Lions in Wellington County, Ontario, Canada, a Diabetes & Patient Education Centre at the Groves Memorial Community Hospital received beneficial technology. The facility serves patients with type 1, type 2, and gestational diabetes through educational programming to help patients learn about diabetes and what steps they can take to stay healthy.

A US\$50,000 LCIF grant was combined with US\$160,000 in support from the local Lions in District A-15. Grant funds supported audiovisual system for the education rooms, as well as computers for patient consultation rooms.

The nine Lions clubs supporting the project include Ariss, Maryhill, Arthur, Belwood & District, Elora, Fergus, Grand Valley, Hillsburgh & District, Marsville & District, and Rockwood & District. These Lions commitment to diabetes education, prevention, and treatment has made an incredible difference to citizens in Ontario.

Catch the Ace Puts Hagersville Lions on the Map!

Hagersville Lions Club was looking for a new way to raise funds for the club's activities. Lion **Dan Matten** heard of the Chase the Ace that successfully held in Nova Scotia. He brought the idea to the club and it was decided to go ahead and apply for a licence to hold this "new" fundraiser. The Hagersville "Catch the Ace" is a joint fundraiser between the Hagersville Rocks committee, the Hagersville Chamber of Commerce and the Hagersville Lions Club.

Hagersville Rocks will be donating its half of the money raised to West Haldimand General Hospital through the Hagersville Hospital and Healthcare Foundation, and the Lions are giving their money to the Hagersville Food Bank and other local not-for-profits and community initiatives. This concept was done in conjunction with the Hagersville Rocks organization, led by Rob Phillips, who is also the chair of the Hagersville Chamber of Commerce.

The first round started on December 2019 but had to be suspended and put on hold in March 2020 because of Covid. It resumed October 2020 and the lucky winner who drew the Ace of Spades walked away with a little over \$10,000.00. The club raised about \$15,500 and half was donated to the Hagersville Food Bank and the other half to the West Haldimand Hospital and Healthcare Foundation.

The clubs decided to apply for a second round, and applied for and received an 'in-person' license that was open-ended in terms of sales and jackpot from the AGCO. We wanted people to come out in person and socialize. As Covid eased off, Catch the Ace was the perfect reason to come to the Hagersville Legion – who hosted us and helped us greatly. It then became quite the community event.

Round two started early in May 2022 and sold one hundred and fifty-two tickets that day. It was a long, slow road to promote the event. In week twenty, we had sold three hundred and seventy-four tickets that carried a progressive jackpot of \$8,033.00.

It was advertised heavily on Facebook and other social media, on our community Lions sign and elsewhere. Lion Dan wrote regular reports every week of the draw that were published by the "Haldimand Press" who were a major source of support. The weekly draws were live-streamed on Facebook, and the longer it went on, the more popular it became. As the event was made public, viewers watched developments as Ace MC Lion Dan tried to make the draw an entertaining event.

By week thirty, over four thousand tickets

were sold and the jackpot rose to over \$15,000.00. It was in mid-January 2023 at week thirty-four that it crossed the \$100,000.00 mark and at the end of January, the jackpot reached \$222,047.00.

This caught the attention of the town, the whole county and beyond. On February 16th we crossed the \$500,000 line and the regional media like CHCH and CTV began reporting on the Catch the Ace in Hagersville. This caused an onslaught of people comimg to Hagersville to participate in the chase of the elusive Ace of Spades resulting in selling over 70,000 tickets in week forty.

Mid-March we exceeded one million dollars for our progressive jackpot and CBC started regular reporting. This caused an explosion in ticket sales and the club had to seriously adjust our work force and organization to accommodate the surge. Police officers were hired and as well as a security company and portable toilets were put up. Despite waiting times of over one hour in a line-up, people were in good spirits.

On average a Catch the Ace event lasts twenty-five to thirty weeks. This session crossed week forty and was still going strong. The tension and expectations rose and more tickets sold in the weeks that followed. In week forty-five an astonishing one hundred and fifty-two tickets were sold and almost ten thousand people came to Hagersville to buy tickets. The whole town was affected. The traffic on the draw days was very heavy and parking exceptionally difficult.

In week forty-five the drama was over, the Ace of Spades was drawn and the winner, Richard Marshall won over two million dollars. Richard is from the town of Nanticoke in Haldimand County, not far from Hagersville. He is 83 years old was a commercial fisherman all his life. Richard stated that he will help his kids and grandchildren with their education and that he and his wife want to travel to Switzerland where his wife is originally from.

Overall the town had a secondary gain as people from all over came to town, went to restaurants, and frequented town retailers.

The whole town helped pull this phenomenal event off and made it the success it became. The **Fisherville** and **Port Dover Lions** were involved and their assistance was most appreciated. This is



the Lions spirit we love, serving the community. Another side effect the Catch the Ace has is the Lions in general were promoted. Many people learned about the Lions, what they are, what they do and that they are supporting the community. In fact, five more people have joined the club.

Catch the Ace is a variation of a 50/50 raffle. In this case, 50% of the winnings are split: 20% for the winner of the weekly draw, 30% goes into a progressive jackpot, and the other 50% are the funds raised for our supported causes.

In preparation for Catch the Ace, we took a new deck of 52 playing cards and put each card into a separate envelope. After tumbling them in a raffle drum, we pulled them out randomly and individually numbered the envelopes from 1 to 52. This ensures the integrity of the event and makes sure that which card is in each envelope and what envelope has the Ace of Spades is unknown.

Once purchased, the players fill in their name and phone number and must choose an envelope number between one and fifty-two with the exception of numbers already chosen in the previous week's draws. All tickets sold go into the drum and the draw for the weekly winning ticket is held.

The ticket that is drawn is the weekly winner for that evening who receives twenty percent of the funds from that day's ticket sales. The envelope is opened with the number that was entered on the winning ticket. If the card is the Ace of Spades the winner will also win the jackpot and the game is over. If it is not the Ace of Spades we will put the card on the placeholder on our displayed game board corresponding with the number that was on the envelope and the raffle goes on until the Ace of Spades is drawn. This can be a maximum of fifty-two weeks and might accumulate a huge jackpot, as in this case over two million dollars.


