# **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**INTERNATIONAL BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING Boston, Massachusetts, USA – July 4-6, 2023



#### **AUDIT COMMITTEE**

 The committee received an update from Lions Clubs International Internal Audit and will continue to follow up and monitor action plans.

#### **CONSTITUTION & BY-LAWS COMMITTEE**

- The committee denied an election complaint filed in District 300-A2 and agreed Lion Yang-Yang Yen be declared the second vice district governor for the 2023-2024 year.
- The committee denied an election complaint filed in District 324-D and agreed Lion R. Dinakaran be declared the second vice district governor for the 2023-2024 year.
- 3. The committee denied an election complaint filed in District 315-B2 and agreed Lion Shahadat Hossain be declared the second vice district governor for the 2023-2024 year.
- 4. The committee upheld an election complaint filed in District 300-D5 and appointed Second Vice District Governor Hung Chieh Chu as first vice district governor for the 2023-2024 year.
- 5. The committee upheld an election complaint filed in District B-3 and agreed the second vice district governor position remain vacant for the 2023-2024 year.
- 6. The committee upheld an election complaint filed in District 306-B2 and agreed the second

- vice district governor position remain vacant for the 2023-2024 year.
- The committee denied an election complaint filed in Multiple District 315 and agreed Lion Nazmul Haque be declared the endorsed international director candidate.
- 8. The committee denied an election complaint filed in Multiple District 103 and agreed Lion Guy-Bernard Brami be declared the endorsed international director candidate.
- 9. The committee passed a resolution removing Sunita Bansal as district governor of District 321-C2 for the remainder of the 2022-2023 term, along with not recognizing service as a past district governor and not being a member of any club due to conduct unbecoming a Lion.
- 10.The committee passed a resolution that the undistricted area of Cyprus become Provisional District 135 at the close of the 2024 International Convention, with Past International Director Robert Rettby appointed as Coordinating Lion due to the refusal of current leadership to cooperate with efforts to unite Lions clubs across Cyprus.
- 11.The committee passed a resolution allowing the Lions of South Korea to form a national foundation, the Korea Council of Lions Clubs Foundation.

- 12. The committee passed a resolution allowing the Republic of North Macedonia to form a foundation, subject to district approval of changes to the foundation's name and by-laws.
- 13.The committee passed a resolution approving the Ad Hoc Committee on Board Representation for the 2023-2024 year.
- 14. The committee passed a resolution approving changes to the advisory committee charter.

#### **CONVENTION COMMITTEE**

- Approved update to Chapter VIII, Paragraph B. of the Board Policy Manual, to allow for Lions to select their own convention hotel without the requirement to stay within their own delegations assigned hotel.
- Evaluated the appointment criteria for the role
  of an international convention chairperson
  at the multiple and/or district levels and
  requested that the technology and marketing
  staff evaluate ways to simplify the appointment
  process.

#### **DISTRICT AND CLUB SERVICE COMMITTEE**

- 1. Appointed Lions to serve as the Coordinating Lions for 2023-2024.
- 2. Revised the responsibilities of the District and Multiple District Marketing Chairperson to streamline the application process for the

- International Marketing Award.
- 3. Revised the description of zones and regions as written in the Standard Form District ByLaws to encourage the chartering of new clubs.
- Revised the Standard Form District Constitution to grant voting rights as cabinet members to District Global Action Team members and the LCIF District Coordinators.
- 5. Reduced the number of days required to notify clubs of district or multiple district redistricting proposals from 60 days to 30 days.
- 6. Revised the process for investigating inactive and fictious clubs to streamline the process.

#### FINANCE & HEADQUARTERS OPERATION COMMITTEE

- 1. Approved the FY 2022-2023 4th Quarter Forecast, reflecting a deficit.
- 2. Approved the FY 2023-2024 final budget, reflecting a deficit.
- 3. Proposed changes to the Operating Reserve Policy be discussed with the Finance and Headquarters Operation Committee at the July 2023 new committee meeting for referral to the Long Range Planning Committee in August 2023.
- 4. Approved placing the Türkiye Lions Clubs on modified protective status through December 2023, with reviews to occur at the 2023-2024 board meetings by the Finance & Headquarters Operation Committee for specified clubs impacted by the earthquake.
- 5. Amended the Executive Officer Reimbursement Policy to allow approval by the International President of additional miles for the Third Vice President to travel in support of Mission 1.5.
- Amended Chapter XXIII, A.10. of the Board Policy Manual to accommodate travel for leadership to forums required for Mission 1.5.
- Amended Lions International Procurement Policy to allow an exception to the bid process for Convention Ground Transportation and to change the Signature Authorization Level Matrix.

#### LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

- 1. Approved the updated 2023 District Governors-Elect Seminar group leader team to include replacement group leaders for Spanish, Swedish and Italian groups.
- 2. Approved the curriculum plan and schedule for the 2023-2024 First Vice District Governors/ District Governors-Elect Seminar.
- 3. Approved the 2024 District Governors-Elect Seminar group leader team.
- 4. Revised the Board Policy Manual, Chapter

- XIV, Paragraph D.10. to reorder and clarify DistrictGovernors-Elect Seminar group leader qualifications and to ensure group leaders will not certify as an international director or international third vice president candidate from the beginning of the term as group leader through the seminar at convention.
- 5. Revised the Board Policy Manual so that, when the second vice president selects either the mixed or regional model to organize the districts and establish the number of group leaders required, the mixed model allows for a maximum of thirty-one groups and the regional model allows for a maximum of thirty-six groups.

#### LONG RANGE PLANNING (MAY 2023 MEETING REPORT)

- Received a feasibility report and recommendation from the Lions International Strategic Plan project team on new growth models.
- 2. Received a progress report on the Lions International Strategic Plan and a preview of plans for the coming year.
- 3. Reviewed a working draft of the plan to grow Lions Clubs International to 1.5 million members by July 1, 2027.
- Discussed Leo-Lion representation on the Lions Clubs International Foundation Board of Trustees.
- Discussed Central and Eastern European Global Action Team and Coordinating Lion Collaboration.
- 6. Discussed the creation of guidelines and criteria for reviewing funding requests for advocacy events.
- Received an update on Lions Clubs International Foundation partnership discussions with the World Food Program.

#### **MARKETING COMMITTEE**

- 1. Reviewed the 2022-2023 forecasts and the 2023-2024 budget for the Marketing Division.
- 2. Reviewed an update on new support for the launch of Mission 1.5.
- 3. Reviewed an update on how the association handles trademarks for forums, websites and digital products.
- 4. Reviewed plans to distribute the Peace Poster and Essay Contest in digital format.
- Reviewed global public relations strategies and year-end results. Reviewed marketing grant support.
- Reviewed brand programs and strategies and year-end results. Reviewed marketing grant support.

- 7. Reviewed status on the move to the Lions International brand as part of the Lions International Strategic Plan.
- 8. Reviewed the Marketing Committee charter. No changes were made.
- 9. Reviewed the award table to make recommended changes in support of Mission 1.5. The update will earmark and add a certain number of presidential and leadership medals devoted to recognition for chartering new clubs and adding new members. Criteria for usage is still being finalized. These adjustments will be made in the Board Policy Manual, Chapter XIX.
- 10.Reviewed an update to the international protocol in the Board Policy Manual, Chapter XIX, to add Leo Advisory Panel members. The committee discussed and unanimously agrees that the Leo Advisory Panel members should be included in protocol in the appropriate location based on various factors.

#### **MEMBERSHIP DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE**

- Discussed Membership Development Grants and requested a more detailed application be completed prior to committee review. This should include specific information about who is responsible for each step of the plan and when it will be completed.
- 2. Discussed District 3234 D2, and lifted the moratorium, appointing Lion Vijay Bhandari the district governor for the 2023-2024 term.
- 3. In addition, Lions Narendra Bhandari, Girish Malpani, Rajesh Kothavade and Raj Muchhal will have their titles stripped for a period of two years. Lion Parmanand Sharma can run for office again after a period of two years, rather than the previously decided five years.
- 4. Sunset the role of specialty club coordinator, encouraging districts use Global Extension Team coordinators to form both traditional and specialty clubs.
- 5. Launched a membership initiative, Mission 1.5, to grow membership to 1.5 million Lions, with positive net growth in all constitutional areas.
- 6. Updated the Global Action Team policy to support Mission 1.5, including the discontinuation of the GAT Success Story funding and the GAT Chairpersons medal.

#### **SERVICE ACTIVITIES COMMITTEE**

- 1. Reviewed the 2022-2023 fourth quarter forecast.
- Discussed the 2023-2024 budget and supported the Lions of India request for funding for an India Advocacy Day.

- 3. Received a report on service reporting, including the number of people served, the number of service activities, and the percentage of clubs reporting service.
- 4. Received an update on advocacy initiatives including Lions Day with the United Nations events and advocacy days.
- 5. Recommended updates to Lions International's Advocacy Guidelines.
- 6. Discussed global causes and service programs, including new environment resources, support for refugees and displaced persons, and diabetes awareness and education.
- 7. Received an update on the 2023 season of Lions-Elevance Health Volunteer Days.
- 8. Received an update on the Lions International Strategic Plan episodic volunteer service projects.

9. Reviewed the Service Activities Division 2023-2024 annual plan.

#### **TECHNOLOGY COMMITTEE**

- 1. Received final updates on supporting the 2023 International Convention and election in Boston.
- 2. Reviewed the 2022-2023 fourth quarter forecast and the 2023-2024 budget for the Technology Division.
- 3. Received a comprehensive update on the Salesforce project and were informed the Lion Portal is planned to launch in September 2023.
- 4. Discussed change management and member engagement needed to minimize the member impacts with a change to the digital member experience.
- 5. Reviewed updates on privacy initiatives, ongoing steps being taken related to the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR)

- and requested that staff continue the International Organization for Standardization (ISO) 27001 compliance project without formal certification.
- 6. Received an update on the status of the website navigation project and is expected to launch by the second quarter.
- 7. Reviewed updates from the Membership Development Committee and discussed the status of the new club application project that will be implemented as part of the Salesforce project.
- 8. Discussed the need to update Chapter XXVI of the Board Policy Manual, which includes the association's Privacy Policy.

# TWO ROW ON THE GRAND

# **District A2 Caledonia and Grimsby and District Lions**

In July, A2 Lions supported the Two Row On The Grand canoe event. It is a tenday canoe trip down the Grand River from Cambridge Ontario to

Lake Erie that promotes healthy relationships, friendships, and respect between cultures, allowing indigenous and non-indigenous both a chance to grow in understanding based on trust and respect. The event is a symbolic renewal of the Two Row Wampum – the original peace treaty between indigenous and settler communities. The vision is an annual canoe trip where participants, native and non-native, build mutual respect and understanding of individual values and culture through sharing the river, meals, campgrounds, mutual aid, cultural/environmental teachings, friendship and summer fun.

This experience results in long-lasting friendships, an increased understanding of each other and our cultures, and through friendship,

peace. Participants partake in educational events given by knowledgeable persons each day: treaties, cultural teachings, dance/social demonstrations, storytelling, environmental concerns, and sharing circles. Approval was received from all municipalities along the Grand River to stop in each community and host cultural events open to local community members.

The Caledonia Lions Club provided funding for a special breakfast on Day 4 on Six Nations of the Grand River property serving 105 participants. The Grimsby and District Lions provided funding and home baking on Day 10 of the paddle for breakfast at Byng Island in Dunnville. 5 Grimsby Lions attended to serve 80 participants at the breakfast table.

Through this experience participants can build long-lasting friendships with those in surrounding communities and renew Treaty relationships in the spirit of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission recommendation 45. At the end of the canoe trip in Post Maitland, a culminating event commemorates the polishing of the chain of friendship between Canadians and Six Nations



# Bringing Out the Best in Others

#### Lifting others up is what she does.

Dr. Patti Hill is an accomplished teacher, administrator, psychologist and small-business owner. But it isn't her impressive resume that she'll mention when you ask what's important to her.

"The purpose of my life on this earth is to help others achieve their potential. If I'm not doing that, I should be!"

Dr. Hill makes it her mission to find the potential in others and to create an environment that helps them thrive. "I always see the good in people," she says.

Every step in Dr. Hill's career was made because she believed in doing her part to ensure others could achieve their dreams. When she was asked to teach special education in secondary school, she agreed and then promptly enrolled in a master's program focusing on teaching the deaf and hard of hearing.

While she was a young teacher, Dr. Hill's uncle Eddie, who was deaf, had shared stories with her about the difficulty of traveling to distant boarding schools to be educated. Even then, he wasn't allowed to use sign language in school. She hoped she could make education better for students like her uncle.

While working as a teacher of deaf students, Dr. Hill was presented with the results of student testing performed by school psychologists. They informed her that although the students did well in visual perception, they scored low in verbal skills. Stunned, Dr. Hill used American Sign Language as she responded, "You didn't even sign to them!"

She knew her students couldn't achieve their full potential if they couldn't even use their primary source of communication. She didn't want the same thing to happen to them that had happened to her uncle Eddie, so she began taking psychology classes to create a better way to assess students.

Classes eventually turned into a doctorate degree, and now she's a licensed psychologist.

Dr. Hill served for a time as principal at a specialty school for children with severe speech and language development challenges in Edmonton, Alberta, Canada. She also started a consultancy business using her knowledge and experience to help government agencies design and implement better programs for children, youth and their families, which she's been running for more than 40 years.

Dr. Patti Hill devoted her life to making the world a better place. Along the way, she found Lions.

Actually, Lions found her.



# Making the World a Better Place

It turned out that Dr. Hill's business partner was married to a Lion. When district Lions organized a project to help fund cochlear implants for those in need, they wanted someone with knowledge of the deaf community, so they turned to Patti for guidance. Of course, she was happy to help.

When Dr. Hill became the founding principal of The Heritage School, Lions wanted to return the favor. "What do you need?" they asked.

Dr. Hill was happy to have Lions' help, but she didn't expect them to keep coming back.

But the Lions persisted.

In fact, they asked her to become a Lion. More than once.

There was no question her life was already busy. In addition to her business and her job as principal, she was finishing her Ph.D. and expecting her first child. Even so, she couldn't turn them away.

In 1990, she joined the Edmonton Host Lions Club. She soon realized her club was more than just a local club; it was a critical part of a global association of clubs just like hers that were serving in nearly every country on earth. Being a Lion was the perfect way to do what she had always wanted to do—make the world a better place.

One of her first projects showed Dr. Hill just how powerful being a Lion can be. The hospital in Edmonton didn't have a dedicated pediatric operating suite. This meant every time a child required surgery, the equipment had to be manually adjusted to accommodate these young patients. This added more complexity and discomfort to an already harrowing experience for children and their parents. Dr. Hill and her club asked how much it would cost to

build a specialized operating suite for children. The response? Three hundred thousand dollars.

"And we did it," she says. With the help of LCIF, they raised every penny. "That's when I knew that Lions could have real impact."

When she attended her first multiple district convention, she realized that the impact wasn't limited to Edmonton.

As she walked around the venue and saw the displays of all the projects Lions had done that year and heard the conversations taking place, she realized the scale of it all. That's when she knew she was part of something much bigger than she could've imagined.

"I get it now," she said. Dr. Hill realized Lions weren't just changing their communities, they were changing the world.


Changing the world is what she is focused on as our international president.

## **Lions Camp Dorset**

#### **Submission from Toronto Doctors Lions Club**

Lions International Youth Camps and EThe Lions Camp Dorset is not a name that most people are familiar with, but for kidney dialysis patients in Ontario, it is a haven. Patients live a life tied to their homes. Treatments lasting several hours and occuring several times a week make it impossible for the patients and their families to have a vacation. Dorset resort allows dialysis patients and their families to spend a week in a more than suitable facility for their needs. They receive treatments at the state-of-the-art onsite dialysis unit under the care of two Camp Dorset dialysis nurses, as well as staff from their home hemodialysis unit.


The camp had humble beginning. In 1972 Hamilton East Lions rented cottages in Parry Sound for two families living with dialysis. A third cottage was rented to house the dialysis machine. In 1973, 6 families were brought to camp for a relaxing getaway. By 1974 they brought 12 families to Dorset, but with funds exhausted 30 families were on a waiting list. The idea of a Lions Camp Dorset came about at the 1974 International Lions Convention. Lion Sandy Ailles of **Dorset** and Lion **Herb Walpole** of Hamilton East had a chance meeting. The Dorset Lions had obtained 380 acres of crown land in the early 70s as part of a plan to build baseball diamonds. However, after hearing of Hamilton East's dialysis retreats, the idea of building a full-scale camp emerged. Soon after, Hamilton East Lions and the Dorset Lions began to raise funds for the camp.

In April 1978, construction began. **Ridgeway Lions Club** played a large role, bringing in and operating the heavy equipment to clear the land, helping with roadways, foundations, buildings, and infrastructure. In the first year, 3 cottages were built and 5 more were constructed in 1979. A member of the Ridgeway Lions

arranged substantial donations from shipping companies he worked with, for the donation of mattresses, furniture, and televisions. Lions Camp Dorset acquired the property lease later from the Lions. The property of 51.69 acres was then bought by the Camp Dorset Corporation from the Ministry of Natural Resources. With some assistance from corporate sponsors and various government grants, the Lions of Ontario has developed the Camp into a unique facility. Construction was completed by Lions, Lioness, Leos and other vounteers.

There is a 10,000 sq.ft community centre which was built in 1993-94. This facility is used by guests and their families as well as by the community.

The camp has a 3500 sq.ft. banquet hall, a large commercial kitchen, indoor swimming pool, indoor pickle ball court, 2 tennis courts, mini golf, and a baseball diamond. Fall colours are spectacular. Toronto Doctors Lions Club has held a weekend retreat at the Camp for last 20 years to raise awareness, networking, and having FUN. Imagine going to a resort in the amazing setting on the shores of Raven Lake with all the facilities and great schedule of entertainment and fellowship at cost of \$150 which covers 5 meals (Friday dinner, 3 meals Saturday and brunch on Sunday. Children younger than age 5 are no charge and children ages 6-13, only \$30). All meals are prepared and served by Doctors Lions Club faculty. There are 15 efficiency units - essentially self-contained bachelor apartments. They have a three-piece bathroom equipped with a wheelchair friendly shower enclosure, a living room area, and a double or twin beds. Units have radiant in-floor heating. There are garden doors that open out to a patio walkway equipped with lawn chairs. These units are designed for couples.



There are 15 cottages. Every cottage is equipped with three bedrooms (double/twin size beds) a living room and a 3 or 4 piece bathroom. Guests bring their own pillow covers, bed sheets and personal care items. The Dialysis retreat is set for October 20th-22nd, 2023.

Gilles started his running career in 1981 thru to 2011. Each of these 31 years, he qualified for the Provincial games, an amazing record. Lion Gilles continues to run to this day and recently participated in the 2023 Sudbury Rocks event 5 km run. Not bad for a man in his 60's.




