INTERNATIONAL BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING Cairo, Egypt – October 13-16, 2023



AUDIT COMMITTEE

- The committee received a preliminary draft of The International Associations of Lions Clubs' audited financial statements and report for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2023.
- Received an updated risk assessment, internal audit plan, and internal audit overview presentation from staff.

CONSTITUTION & BY-LAWS COMMITTEE

- Amended the constitutional interpretation to require members to be full dues paying members of a single club for a continuous period of one year and a day before they count towards their club's total delegate entitlement.
- 2. Amended the Advisory Committee to Review Vice President Candidates to require a final report and recommendation by July 31.
- 3. Amended the Guidelines to Recommend Third Vice President Candidate to require the Executive Committee to review the recommendation of the Advisory Committee on or before the August Executive Committee meeting, and for the Board of Directors to recommend a candidate on or before the October/November board meeting.
- Housekeeping to remove items from the title in the Board Policy Manual, Chapter III, Paragraph G., which are currently listed under their own paragraphs.

CONVENTION COMMITTEE

 Discussed and approved per diem allocations for Presidential Convention Appointees who qualify for reimbursement and headquarter staff supporting the 106th Lions International Convention.

- 2. Discussed and approved the 2024 Line of March for the Parade of Nations.
- Requested the Convention Division to conduct a full assessment of Board Policy Manual, Chapter VIII Convention, A.8., Reinspection of Convention City.

DISTRICT AND CLUB SERVICE COMMITTEE

- 1. Approved the redistricting proposal submitted by Multiple District 201 to combine 201- W1 (Australia) and 201-W2 (Australia).
- 2. Approved the redistricting proposal submitted by District 320-C (India) to bifurcate into District 320-C (India) and 320-H (India).
- 3. Appointed Lion Fikret Sendil as the acting District Governor for Provisional District 135 (Cyprus) to enable him to take the necessary steps to create a cabinet and prepare to take the position of 2024-2025 District Governor.
- 4. Approved a housekeeping item to remove the repeated phase "Perform such duties and other directives as may be required by the district officers or by the policy of the International Board of Directors." in the Standard Form District By-Laws,
- 5. Approved changes to the redistricting policy to allow districts with 1,000 or more members and districts less than 1,000 that are growing an average of 1% or more, to vote on a redistricting proposal that impacts the district. This policy change is contingent on a 2 constitutional amendment, which will be considered by the Constitution and By-Laws Committee in March 2024.

FINANCE & HEADQUARTERS OPERATION COMMITTEE

- 1. Approved the FY 2023-2024 1st Quarter Forecast, reflecting a deficit.

- 3. Approved a resolution to authorize staff at Lions Clubs International (LCI), Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) and the ISAME Regional Office to administer Enet banking for the LCIF bank account at HDFC bank in India.
- 4. Revised the reference to Operating Reserve in the Budget section of Chapter XI FINANCE of board policy.

- 10.Revised Chapter XIV, Leadership Development, of Board Policy for new director orientation to be held immediately following the international convention at the site thereof.

LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

- 1. Supported the plan to transition the current ALLI Leo-Lion Scholarship to a Faculty Development Institute (FDI) scholarship beginning in 2024-2025.
- Established for LCIP participants who do not certify on the first attempt a time limit of two years to apply and submit the required video for LCIP certification.
- 3. Approved an extension of the Leadership Development Institute Grant deadline through December 31, 2023.
- 4. Supported future survey of multiple districts and single districts to inform the design of the future model of Second Vice District Governors and First Vice District Governors/District Governors-Elect training programs.
- Revised the Board Policy Manual by replacing the phrase "District Governor Team Manual" with "District eBook."

LONG RANGE PLANNING (AUGUST 2023 MEETING REPORT)

- 1. Resolved to create an ad hoc committee to study how to make LCI more friendly to women and young people.
- Resolved to amend board policy to require forum discussions occur at a minimum of one board meeting, annually, rather than at every meeting.
- Resolved to conduct a research study of Lions International's global causes and the potential addition of mental health or wellness.
- 4. Received an update on Mission 1.5 program elements and provided direction to staff.
- Recommended the creation of an ad hoc committee to develop a Leo membership category and referred the matter to the Membership Development Committee.
- 6. Recommended the creation of a working group to study the development of a corporate club model and referred the matter to the Membership Development Committee.
- 7. Recommended amending board policy to hold New Director Orientation at the location of the Lions International Convention, and limiting the length to one day, referring the matter to the Finance and Headquarters Operation and Leadership Development Committees for implementation.

- 8. Reviewed and discussed options for revising LCI's operating reserve policy.
- 9. Requested staff conduct a comprehensive review of LCI's board policy manual.

MARKETING COMMITTEE

- 1. Approved 43 Marketing Grants for the 2023-2024 fiscal year. Seven (7) were declined due to funding issues. Funds have been exhausted for this year.
- 2. Approved Marketing Grant funding allocation for Provisional Regions (US\$3000), Undistricted Areas (US\$3000) and Provisional Areas (US\$1500).
- 3. Reviewed a request from multiple districts in China Taiwan requesting the ability to produce separate magazines in each multiple district. Four out of five requesting multiple districts (MD 300A Taiwan, MD 300B Taiwan, MD 300C Taiwan and MD 300E Taiwan) meet the member requirement to produce their own magazines. In order to ensure that all distinguished Lions in MD 300D Taiwan have access to the LION Magazine, the board committee refers this matter to local leadership in MD 300A-E Taiwan to discuss solutions to include MD 300D Taiwan with another publication. The Marketing Committee has a concern that separating magazine editorial teams for the country could create inefficiency in local magazine operations and make it difficult to align messaging. It is therefore the current view of the committee that the MD 300 Taiwan magazine should be maintained, instead of each multiple district maintaining separate versions.
- 4. Amended the international protocol in Board Policy Manual, Chapter XIX to remove the "Global Action Team Regional Area Leader" position and reordered Line #8 to recognize current Board Appointees before Past Trustees.

MEMBERSHIP DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

- 1. Approved the 2024-2026 Leo Club Advisory Panel.
- 2. Discussed next steps to investigate corporate membership opportunities.
- 3. Reviewed and update the committee on the MISSION 1.5 rollout and
 - a. Approved additional funds for training Global Action Team district and multiple district coordinators.
 - b. Approved additional giveaways to promote the initiative.
- 4. Approved an ad hoc committee be created to investigate Leos as Members.
- Recommended increased mileage allowance for Leo-Lion Board Liaisons.
- 6. Created policy in Board Policy Manual chapter

- XXII, adding a membership chairperson to the Leo Club Program structure.
- 7. Updated policy in Board Policy Manual chapter XVII, clarifying the rights of a discounted member, and aligning discount programs with the new discounted member category.

The Espanola Lions learned a little girl in their town was diagnosed with Pompe Disease. Until they found out about this child, many had never heard of this disease. Pompe Disease is a genetic condition in which a complex sugar called glycogen builds up in the lysosomes of your body's cells. The disease occurs when you lack a specific digestive enzyme called acid alpha-glucosidase (GAA). The condition causes severe muscle weakness and wasting. Without early detection and treatment, the disease can be fatal. The club did a fundraiser to help with the research being done at Duke Health Rare Disease Centre at Duke University in the US. This facility is a leading researcher for Pompe Disease and has made many breakthroughs in early detection and treatment to improve the lives of those with this disease.

The Espanola Lions held a fundraising BBQ to raise awareness and money for this research. Due to the generosity of the people of Espanola, they raised \$5000.00 to donate for further research. Once again.... small town HUGE HEART.

In late 2021, a massive submarine volcano erupted in Tonga, unleashing a catastrophic event. The eruption left a trail of destruction in its wake, with boats destroyed, neighborhoods covered in ash, and entire islands submerged. To make matters worse, an undersea cable became disconnected during the storm, leaving the true extent of the damage unknown to the outside world, while affected communities navigated uncertainty and chaos in a communication blackout. Eventually, when communication was restored and the news came out, nearby Lions in District 202K, including the Vava'u Lahi Lions Club in Tonga, knew they had to lend a helping hand, but they were not sure how.

"Unfortunately, when disasters like this strike remote locations, access is limited and their remoteness reduces the speed at which external help can get to them in times of emergencies," Past District Governor (PDG) Roger Robinson says. Moreover, the impact of this disaster was extreme. Hunga Tonga Hunga Ha'apai began erupting on December 20, 2021, and its ash cloud was visible from the distant capital city of Nuku'alofa, 70 kilometers (43 miles) away. The eruption peaked on January 15, 2022, almost four weeks later, sending massive ash clouds 57 kilometers (35 miles) into the sky. This caused panic among the local population, struggling to breathe amidst the choking ash. The Tongan government issued a tsunami warning after witnessing waves in Nuku'alofa.

As the news broke, Lions saw aerial footage revealing devastating scenes of sediment-laden waters, villages swept away or severely damaged, roofs buried under layers of ash, and coastlines permanently altered. They could not

watch without feeling compelled to serve their neighbors.

"New Zealand has had a long association with the islands in the South Pacific and we are all located far away from the rest of the world, so we need to look after ourselves," PDG Robinson shares. "When disaster happens in their area, we, as New Zealanders are immediately there to help. The eruption and the tsunami that followed in Tonga were no exception."

Lions in District 202K realized clean drinking water was a very precious commodity they could offer in response to the disaster, so they decided to install water tanks and request Disaster Grant funding from Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF). District 202K, which includes Lions clubs in Fiji, Samoa, American Samoa, Vava'u Tonga, and Northern New Zealand, submitted and received US\$24,100 in grant funds to support this project. Due to communication challenges and government-issued COVID-19 protocols preventing travel, LCIF and the Lions collaborated with the Tongan Red Cross to install nine water tanks to collect rainwater at three public schools on three different islands.

Since many of the Tongan islands are lowlying coral atolls, the groundwater could become contaminated with salt water, making it undrinkable. With the collection tanks, people can have access to clean water. This was a very challenging project due to the extent of the damage, their remoteness, and the limited facilities available on these islands. However, the Lions made it through these challenges with patience and perseverance. PDG Robinson even made the difficult journey to the islands to see the water tanks firsthand and enhance his relationship with the head of the Tongan Red Cross.

"It is a great feeling knowing you made a positive difference in the lives of those who have benefitted from this project," PDG Robinson says. "LCIF grants have a long history of making a positive impact on the lives of those in need." In spite of the chaos and bleakness of the eruption, the compassionate efforts of Lions in instituting this sustainable water source are not only aiding in the community's healing and restoration, but also providing a ray of hope, giving citizens a glimpse of the promising future ahead.






Take a Book Share a Book - Omemee Lions & Lioness

But serving in pickleball, now that's a relatively new thing, and Lions who try it are getting stuck on it like syrup on pancakes.

Pickleballin' in the Midwest

"Lifelong friendships are made out of this," Lion Curt Goke in Minnesota says of both Lions and pickleball. Goke, 77, a member of the Eden Prairie Lions Club since 2017, plays pickleball three times a week and teaches beginners after church on Sundays. He has competed in 43 tournaments and played in at least 70 venues. His wife, Jane, equally as active, qualified to play in the 2019 Margaritaville USA Pickleball National Championships.

Pickleball has also created new fundraising opportunities for clubs. The sport is so popular in Goke's town that the Eden Prairie Lions partnered with the Twin City Pickleball Club to sponsor a tournament as part of the Lions' biggest fundraiser, the annual Schooner Days. Pickleball registration filled in early April for the June event.

When Curt and Jane swapped their racquetball racquets for pickleball paddles about 14 years ago, few people knew what the sport was. Now all ages vie for time on the courts.

A hybrid of badminton, tennis and ping-pong, pickleball has been the fastest growing sport in the U.S. for three years running, according to the Sports & Fitness Industry Association. It is

played in almost every country.

Serving up fun and fitness on the East Coast

In New Hampshire, Ron Farina, a member of the Keene Lions Club, has enjoyed seeing the sport's popularity explode. Farina is a USA Pickleball Association Ambassador and proud to say he has played on the courts at Bainbridge Island, Washington, where the sport was founded. For about 50 years he was happy with tennis, playing every week, indoors or out, with his friend, Rich.

"One day Rich said he was switching to pickleball. How would you like to come to a pickleball lesson?" Farina recalls. "I took that one lesson, and I couldn't believe the workout and how much fun it was. I played one more game of tennis and I never went back."

Farina was soon playing pickleball six days a week on a tennis court with markings for pickleball. Off court he found himself dreaming about converting two of the city's old tennis courts into six pickleball courts.

A Keene Lion for 53 years, he is known in his club and his community as a man who gets things done. Anxious to make his dream happen for the city of Keene, he began meeting with Lions and

city leaders to educate them on pickleball
— not just how fun it is, but how it
can be used to increase awareness of
diabetes and the importance of exercise.
Eventually some of his listeners tried
the sport, came back to the table, and
supported his efforts.

In 2016, the Keene Lions donated US\$15,900 to have six new courts installed as one of four legacy initiatives marking the 100-year anniversary of Lions International. Farina's list of

people either interested in learning the game or getting time on a court had grown to include 350 email addresses.

Now 85, balance problems are keeping Farina off the courts, but he hopes his daily exercises will help him ease back into playing. He recently gave his job as chairman of the Keene Lions Pickleball Jamboree to a new, young Lion who also loves the game and was eager to get more involved.

In addition, the sport has brought new Lions into the club. Steve Gyory was newly retired when he moved to Keene from New Jersey and joined pickleball to meet people. Wanting to be more active in helping the community, he also explored service organizations in town. One day on the court he asked Farina, "Hey, how can I get involved with Lions?" Today, Gyory is president of the Keene Lions Club.


"When we first opened the gate for the new courts, all six were immediately filled and there were people waiting. The courts continue to be in constant use," says Farina.

"People come 20 miles to play. It's about community, camaraderie and exercise. It's just fun to play."

Rebuilding Nepal: LCIF Funds Over US\$4.7 Million in Grants to Respond to the Gorkha Earthquake

On April 25, 2015, a devastating earthquake in Nepal, known as the Gorkha earthquake, took the lives of nearly 9,000 people, injured almost 23,000, and destroyed about 500,000 homes. This was Nepal's worst natural disaster since 1934. Flattening entire villages, hundreds of thousands of Nepalese became homeless within moments. Many aftershocks occurred which led most of the population to stay outside for at least four to five nights. Then, on May 12, a massive aftershock of 7.3 moment magnitude (Mw), killed over 200 people, injured more than 2,500, and left even more people homeless. This extended disaster caused a great deal of terror within the community. People lost everything and were living outdoors in anguish. As soon as Lions heard about this disaster, they did not hesitate to step in. Lions Clubs International Project Manager and Engineer, Mikesh Shrestha explains, "The disaster brought about an unprecedented level of devastation, loss of lives and human suffering. The Lions have a strong commitment to humanitarian efforts and are among the first to offer help and support when natural disasters strike."

Shortly after the earthquake occurred, Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) awarded a Major Catastrophe Grant (MCAT) of US\$100,000 to MD325 Nepal for disaster relief. Lions' leadership decided to start relief operations in the Gorkha, Dhading and Nuwakot districts; this relief then spread to other districts within two to three days. Emergency materials were sent to the epicenter of the earthquake with a helicopter, and on the return journey, the helicopter evacuated injured individuals from the village. Lions in neighboring India and Bangladesh rallied support and relief supplies to assist in the immediate aftermath of the disaster.

The two earthquakes also affected 39 school

districts, destroying approximately 32,000 classrooms. Many schools began working in Temporary Learning Centers (TLC) that were unable to accommodate the number of students they had before the earthquake. Most temporary classes were running under tents, tarps, and corrugated metal

for extended periods of time, with very few students lucky enough to work under prefab structures. Some schools were even conducting their classes in damaged buildings or under the open sky. As a result, students were skipping classes saying it was difficult to study in such a chaotic environment. When Lions saw the severe damage schools suffered and how this damage was impacting students, they believed they could make a significant difference. They applied for grant funding from LCIF and were awarded two Designated Grants totaling over US\$4.6 million to rebuild 18 schools.

Lions' initial steps were to assess and identify which schools were severely affected. Shrestha says, "Through rigorous surveys of over seventy schools and campuses, we evaluated the extent of damage and urgency for each institution. This phase allowed us to narrow down our focus to the eighteen schools that were in critical need and feasible for reconstruction." Schools play an important role in molding future leaders and this earthquake left nearly 1.5 million children without a proper learning environment. Past Council Chairperson Girdhari Sharma Bhusal says, "Lions felt that these new school buildings are not just physical structures but symbols of



hope, empowering children with the means to learn, grow, and realize their true potential." As the Project Chairperson of the Reconstruction Committee, Bhusal knew Lions could improve the lives of thousands of students if they just kept pushing the project forward even when they faced hardships.

Regrettably, they did face significant challenges, but they persisted for the sake of the students. According to Shrestha, "Thirteen out of the eighteen school locations were quite far away and located in areas with tough landscapes and no proper road access. Materials had to be manually carried to some sites and some even became completely unreachable during the rainy season." Despite all the challenges, Lions felt this project was incredibly rewarding. Bhusal says, "It was a matter of great satisfaction for all of us. As the project was carried out within the stipulated time frame in line with the design and cost estimates, it imparted greater confidence in our ability and diligence. It testified to the fact that the Nepalese Lions can act successfully in collaboration with all state and non-state stakeholders."

Through this impactful collaboration, Lions and LCIF invested in a hopeful future for students in Nepal, offering not just classrooms, but space to encourage learning for generations to come.





The Service of Champions

Lions keep cross country invitational running for 50 years.

In a half-century of competition, innumerable legacies and memories are built, but not all sporting events last 50 years. This October, the Alexandria Lions Meet of Champions will reach that milestone. And just as they've done every year since helping to launch the event, the Alexandria Lions Club will be there on its 50th anniversary helping every step of the way.

Each year, nearly 2,000 runners ages six to 18 from as many as 28 cross country programs participate in the eight events of the meet, which has become one of Minnesota's largest cross country invitationals. In addition, 3,000 to 4,000 spectators attend, creating an electric atmosphere. "The stands are packed," says Jaelyn Miller, a junior with the Alexandria Cardinals girls' varsity team. "It's so loud you can't even hear who they're cheering for."

Keeping Pace with the Times

The Meet of Champions has evolved quite a bit since it began in 1973. In the early years, the race took place in a city park with Lions manually recording the runners' times. Today, runners compete on a well-manicured 3.1-mile (5 km) course at a nearby resort with a professional electronic timing system recording their results.

"We used to have a half-dozen Lions waiting in the chutes," says Lion Ron Branch, the Alexandria club's treasurer. "We had to get the numbers from all of the runners when they crossed the finish line."

While technology has modernized the event, it could never replace the heartbeat of the event: the Lions.

Lion Jerry Hansen has volunteered to help with the Meet of Champions since 1982, his first year as a Lion. "I make a lot of calls," says Hansen, the club's event chairperson for the past 15 years. "Everyone knows what needs to get done. And we get things done quickly."

Preparation Begins in the Offseason

The Lions' involvement begins long before the first starting pistol fires on race day. The club does year-round fundraising. Hansen estimates the club holds at least 12 to 15 waffle feeds during the year, often as part of local church events or private graduation parties, to raise funds for the Meet of Champions as well as the Lions Eye Bank. The fundraisers are such a success that the club has a trailer, branded with the Alexandria Lions Club logo, that's fully stocked with equipment to feed up to 300 people.

Proceeds from the waffle feeds help cover vital aspects of the race, including the trophies and medals. Hansen estimates the Lions purchase around 100 trophies each year at a cost of nearly US\$1,500. The most meaningful of the Lions' trophies is a travelling plaque that goes home with the winning team each year to display until the next race. Countless memories of victory and camaraderie are represented in that plaque.

"The trophies are a starting point to attracting great runners," says Jerry Amundson, Alexandria's assistant cross country coach for 42 years. That comes as no surprise when you see them on display during the event, stretching across two tables in blue-and-gold columns that evoke a city skyline. The Alexandria Lions are committed to making sure the runners leave the event feeling like champions.

A Well-Oiled Machine

In addition to buying the trophies, the Lions

pitch in wherever they can. Over the years, they've secured land-use permissions, found parking solutions, rented portable toilets and hospitality tents, and paid for the electronic race timing. On race day, dozens of Lions help set up the course, which usually involves clearing the colorful fall foliage to make way for the runners, and assist in almost every aspect of the event. Some help direct traffic in the parking lots while others act as guides on the course and finish line judges.

"My daughter runs cross country," says Hansen. "We've seen disorganized meets. People are impressed by how well run the Meet of Champions is."

Teamwork Breeds Champions

It's clear the Meet of Champions has left a deep impression on the city of Alexandria. "After 50 years, the event is embedded in the town," says Hansen. "It becomes part of the fabric."

The Alexandria Lions Club is just as ingrained in their community's fabric as the cross country event that bears its name. While the Meet of Champions is their most prominent event and their waffle feeds have become a mainstay, their service in the community is continuous and unwavering. And it does not go unnoticed. "The Alexandria Lions are interconnected everywhere in the city," says Amundson.

What started as a Lions club connecting with the school to create a sporting event 50 years ago has become much more. According to Travis Hochhalter, head coach of Alexandria Cross Country, "The Meet of Champions is a culmination of who Alexandria is."

Lions Foundation of Canada Dog Guides (L.F.C.D.G.) mission is to empower Canadians with disabilities to navigate their world with confidence and independence by providing Dog Guides at no cost to them and supporting each pair in their journey together.

Established in 1983, L.F.C.D.G. was the first school in Canada to specialize in training Guide Dogs for people who are blind or visually impaired. Now, L.F.C.D.G. is the only service dog school in the world with seven distinct Dog Guide programs (Canine Vision, Hearing, Service, Seizure Response, Autism Assistance, Diabetes Alert, and Facility Support).

From breeding to training to matching, each Dog Guide costs approximately \$35,000 yet is provided at no cost to eligible Canadians from coast to coast and includes a lifetime of follow-up services. L.F.C.D.G. relies on donations from Lions Clubs, members of the public, and corporations to provide these special matches and does not receive any government funding.

Time to Grow to Meet Demand

With one in five Canadians 15 years of age and up living with one or more disabilities, more Canadians are seeking the services of a specialized Dog Guide. To meet the demand, L.F.C.D.G. is building a state-of-the-art, purposebuilt Dog Guide training school.

Right now, the current facility is not accessible to all clients, the 28 guest rooms are scattered

around the building, and there are an insufficient number of classrooms and training areas for each program with uncomfortable learning environments.

What's more, the training spaces are inadequate for Dog Guides

to experience situations as a working dog, the kennels and veterinary clinic are at maximum capacity, and the play area is inadequate for Dog Guides.

In contrast, the new school will be fully accessible to all clients and provide

many improvements, including a classroom and specific training areas for each program. For Dog Guides, the larger and improved kennel space will provide indoor and outdoor spaces to learn, play, and relax which will increase their wellbeing to set them up for success in their training.

These improvements will create a more conducive learning environment and provide the best experience possible while creating better outcomes.



The **Kitchener Pioneer Lions Club** donated the first \$1,000 to kick start the campaign. **Chris Duncan** (past President) called on his fellow Lions to contribute to this campaign and to help spread the word. "I'm super excited about stirring up competition with other Lions Clubs to match or beat my donation."

Lion **Jerry Rebidoux**, District Governor for District A12 has heeded this call, making the CNIB Lake Joe Minibus campaign this year's District Project. Annually, governors have the


Due to the pandemic, new infection-prevention protocols have made it impossible for us to operate our medical facility at full capacity, without first expanding and updating our existing dialysis facility. The cost of this project is estimated to reach or exceed 1.5 million dollars. For every dialysis season we operate at reduced capacity, many patients are denied the opportunity to vacation here. The camp receives provincial funding as an Independent Health Facility to offset the cost to run our medical centre. We understand, not all Lions Clubs have the necessary funds to contribute \$2000.00. We only ask that your club gives what they can.



The original Lions Club closed in 2009.

In 2018/2019 the club had 9 members and were a branch to the **Charlton-Englehart** club. One of the things the Kirkland Lake Club did was to help clean up a local grocery store so that they could re-open after a fire. The store donated baskets to the Lions for their first fundraiser along with space to sell the tickets. The club also manned the kettles for the Salvation Army at Christmas.

One such event was called "Social Isolation Distraction", in which they purchased \$50.00 grocery gift cards and held draws from Facebook posts. An example of that was to nominate someone you felt went above and beyond for others. The community loved the distraction and this gave them something good to talk about.

Another event was the online "Stuff-A-Bear for a Kid" fundraiser. Using advertising on their Facebook page, people could sponsor a stuffed bear that went to North Eastern Ontario Family and Children's Services children. They had a total of 100 sponsors sign up to provide bears to kids. The local senior residencies, TPR and Extendicare, came on board. The seniors had a project to stuff and dress the stuffed animals that were purchased.

They also hosted their first Trade-A-Can for a Cone fundraiser. Joining forces with CJ's Drive In and our local car club, The Road Legends Cruisers, they raised just under \$500, along with a truck bed full of food for the Salvation Army Food Bank.

Towards the end of 2021, the Lions were at 15 members and moving into 2022, they rose to 17. During 2022, the club was fortunate to have many hands that came along with the new members, to which they were able to created sub-committees to run some great fundraisers, such as Breakfast with the Easter Bunny.


District A5 - Bonfield and District Lions

Hospice Peterborough






Peace Posters for Peace Officers

Lion Don Baker Receives Prestigious Award


"You Can't Get Very Far until You Start Doing Something for Somebody Else."

When asked for his comments he simply added: "Wouldn't it be nice to find a way to let everyone know that they can send their used glasses for recycling."

After several years of planning, fundraising and delays, The Milverton Lions celebrated the new courtyard at Knollcrest Lodge in Milverton on July 23, 2023. After fundraising efforts by the local club began in 2019, the courtyard improvements finally came to fruition following the recent completion of roughly six weeks of construction by Drummond Brothers Landscaping.

"It's fantastic," said Lion **Mark Matheson**, chair of the fundraising committee. "It's good for our town. It's good for the nursing home. There are things (in this courtyard) that need to be improved over how they were 10, 20 years ago. There was nothing here originally, so we're digging it all up." While the club's original goal was to raise \$120,000 – a goal they have since reached – the increasing costs of materials and construction have pushed project costs over \$200,000.

The new courtyard includes accessible walkways for all residents, visually appealing flower beds, a raised planter box to allow residents a chance to participate in the beautification of their new outdoor space, two pergolas for shade, and outdoor picnic tables and chairs that were assembled by Lions Club volunteers.



The courtyard was designed with artificial grass, durable outdoor furniture that is easy to clean, and eavestroughs that drain directly into the home's drainagesystem to make the outdoor space easy to maintain for the staff.

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




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Gloucester Lions
