

On a tract of land at the end of Des Chenes Drive, behind the Sault Ste. Marie Airport, is Point Des Chenes. It is approximately 25 acres of fields and wooded area that borders on a kilometer of beautiful sand beach. In the westerly edge of this park is a campground operated by the Sault Ste. Marie Lions Club. The Park was established in the late fifties and in 1964 the campground was added when the City relocated a trailer park from a downtown location.

2006 will mark the 20th year that the Sault Ste. Marie Lions Club has operated the Pointe Des Chenes Campground. From its tenuous beginnings it is now a flourishing success, due to a combination of the many talented managers and the Sault Ste Marie Lion's hard work.

At the end of the camping season in 1985, the Lions took up the call to action to operate the park as a fundraising project, taking over from City management. The first season the Lions acted as contract operators was difficult. An operating committee was formed from club members of the day. They hired a manager that they thought would absolve them of their lack of experience. They rented a van to haul wood and pick up trash with. They stocked the tuck shop like a convenience store and they put a large amount of seed money into a fund for disaster sake. The City Parks Department helped them quite a bit that first season and acted as a resource. Nevertheless, at the end of the season after they had put in thousands of volunteer hours, they came up thousands of dollars short. Valuable lessons were learned that first year and after more debate and insistence by the original committee members, the Lions Club signed a second contract with the city, this time for five years.

Maintenance and improvements came at a cost. All the revenue generated, to date, was turned over to the club and half was turned back to the park. This was now the seed money that improvements and renovations were made from.

Twenty years later the park now has its own water filtration, 100 sites, almost all with power. In the future, the emphasis will continue on the upgrading of existing facilities. The managers have helped to take a service project to a major fund raising venture that the whole community benefits from. For a reservation call Pointe Des Chenes Campground at (705) 779 2696.

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

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Club Renewal: Expanding Our Mission of Service

Lions clubs must continually grow, to never cease reassessing the manner in which they relate to their communities. Consequently, it is vital that every club engage in a periodic renewal, a time to revitalize itself. Doing so, it will be energized to both provide services that are relevant to the community and which meet the personal needs of not only the current membership, but men and women who are considering an opportunity to give of their time and talents in voluntary service.

Let us make 2006-2007 the Year of Club Renewal and, in a word, "reinvent" ourselves through new ways of thinking and conducting business. If we are to move forward and enhance our image as the community's premier service club organization, we must, when necessary, replace old assumptions and attitudes that have outlived their usefulness and develop new ideas and approaches to community service that do, indeed, promise success. I encourage every Lions club at its very first meeting to closely examine everything that it does...service projects, membership growth, relationship with other community leaders and organizations, the way meetings are conducted... anything that relates to the strength and future of the club. There are, in fact, three precise steps to identify how to most effectively meet the needs of both current and prospective members.

First, determine which of your activities are successful and swells enthusiasm within the club. These should obviously be continued and, whenever possible, expanded.

Those projects that have proven to be less successful need to be re-evaluated and improved. Every activity in which your Lions club is engaged must be a quality endeavor and answer needs that are paramount to the community and to the needs of your members.

Also, I know that Lions dislike the thought of abandoning a project, especially one that has been a part of the

club's calendar for many years. However, if, on serious examination, it no longer answers community needs and is unsuccessful, it simply must be dropped and replaced with a new program. All this is essential to what we call the Paradigm Shift.

We cannot maintain activities and practices that are outdated and of little value. It is our responsibility as Lions, as community leaders, to continually develop and implement innovative service projects and workable strategies to bring in new members and the best strategy for growth, I assure you, is to have activities that members, and potential members, consider serious and important. In this way, and only this way, will we strengthen our clubs through membership growth. But it demands a rigorous self-evaluation of where our clubs are and where we want to go.

Let us permanently leave behind the concept of "but that's the way we've always done it!" This absolutely has to be stricken from our method of operation. New ideas need to replace those that no longer work, and this can



only occur when the club members participate in open and constructive discussion. This is the open path to club renewal and development and it will happen when Lions come together to honestly evaluate their situation and determine a course of action for tomorrow. Each club needs to accept the challenge to re-establish its mission of community service and prioritize its goals. This can only be achieved at the club level: it cannot be established from above. Each club must set its own targets for success, in activities and for membership growth. Analyze what is best for your community and for your fellow Lions, and then judge how you can go about reaching these objectives.

A serious evaluation of your club is the key. Employ the three step approach for club renewal and there is no question that you will be able to look forward to a bright and positive future.

Canadian Lions Faculty Development Institute

May 4-7 2006

As spring has arrived in all of Canada our country stretches out its vast glory. We are a land of great spaces and Lions Clubs International travels great distances throughout. Our International Board has authorized the Leadership Department of LCI to develop a Faculty Development Institute in each constitutional area.

PID Bill Moody assembled a faculty including PCC Harry Marissen and PDG Polly Voon with the support of International Director Terry Graham at the Howard Johnston Hotel in Richmond Hill Ontario.

20 Canadian Lions, identified from Multiple Districts 19, 37, 5, 5M, A, U and 41 were invited as participants. They were instructed to effectively present Lions information with the use of visual aids, interactive adult learning, lesson design, session management and evaluations.

The graduates were encouraged to continue this development in their Multiple Districts and Districts through

local forums and institutes. This process will foster greater understanding and develop leadership skills for all Lions who participate.

Through this pilot program, the first of its kind in North America, LCI are developing a core of persons they can recommend for this purpose to conduct Regional Institutes within their Multiple Districts.

Emerging Lions Leadership Institutes are now available regionally, sponsored by a multiple district. Lions Clubs International provides support, direction and curriculum materials to any multiple district wishing to conduct an Emerging Lions Leadership Institute at the regional level. The curriculum focuses on building the skills of Lions members in preparation for leadership opportunities at the club level, particularly the position of club president.

Director Graham reported the results, encouraging Councils and Elects to use this resource. He will be officiating the USA/Canada Forum in Columbus Ohio Sept 14/16, 2006.

Highlights of The MD"A" Council Meeting Sheraton Fallsview Hotel, Niagara Falls June 2, 2006

Presentation by the Lieutenant Governor of Ontario: His Honour, Lieutenant Governor of Ontario, James Bartleman made a presentation about the thousands of children living in the remote aboriginal communities scattered across the far north of Ontario, hundred of kilometers north of Thunder Bay. These children live in third world conditions abject poverty, serious social and mental health problems, and a suicide rate ten times that of the rest of Canada, all within the borders of our own province. The 30% of these children, who manage to stay in school, graduate with a grade 12 diploma and grade 7 educations. Literacy rates very low and the value of literacy has not been instilled in the communities, which are trapped in a vicious circle of hopelessness. The fourth phase of His Honour's program is called "Club Amick for Young Aboriginal Readers". The goal of this program is to reinforce the word of the summer literacy camps by enrolling the participants in a book club. Every two months, each member will receive a brand new book selected just for them and a copy of the Club Amick newsletter. This program will allow native youth to build their own libraries for the first time and schools will be able to integrate Club Amick books into their classroom activities. His Honour proposed that a coordinated effort be launched to inform Lion's communities about the Club Amick program so they may understand the issues and benefits of this project and to develop their own local responses which suit the needs of their respective communities.

Motion to allow the Lieutenant Governor of Ontario, James Bartleman to send out a letter to all clubs in MDA inviting the clubs to participate in this project and to provide a set of labels at no cost. Carried

ID Terry Graham stated that at the meeting with His Honour James Bartleman, it was felt the best way for our clubs to participate was to commit to sponsor one child in the program. The cost would be \$100.00 per year. It is hoped the commitment could be for a five (5) year period. With 550 plus clubs, each club could have a large impact on

the program. Helen Keller said it best "Alone we can do so little." "Together we can do so much."

LFC Ontario Director Michael Salter reported some 2005-2006 highlights: Bequeaths - a huge jump in support. Lions' donations continue to be close to budget and total gifts with sponsorships and Brian Stevenson Fellowships would appear to be up overall. The plan for shift to spring Walk dates has taken off with 129 spring walks now planned. All our Dog Guides programs have continued to grow and we anticipate reaching our goal of over 100 dog guide teams graduating in 2005-2006.

Chairperson Carl Young reported that the Lions Homes for Deaf People (LHDP) have undertaken their next project, which will greatly assist the Canadian Hearing Society (CHS) in their ability to deliver needed services to the hearing impaired. The project as described by LHDP Chair Lion Jack Graydon is as follows: "It is our intention to build the necessary cabinetry, provide the carpentry and electrical support and purchase forty different devices to be displayed in a fully operational manner in every one of the twenty eight offices of the CHS".

Chairperson Yvette Gerber reported that Ryan Chin has moved to another position within CNIB and Jacqueline Harrison would take on this responsibility. She has an extensive camp background with the YMCA in both residential and day camp settings as well as experience in working with a service supported camp. Due club to Government regulations MD"A" was unable to run the 50/50 draw tickets this year for the Lake Joseph camp and in lieu of this an appeal to the Lions and Lioness was made to donate whatever funds they could to the camper sponsorships. The Lions Family of this Multiple raised \$26,715.00 as of May 10th. This is \$10,268.00 more than last year. Yet again the Lions Family stepped up to the plate.

Chairperson Ted Rypma presented his Website report and announced that this year has seen the MD"A" Web site grow with the additions of a Peace Poster Gallery, more historical information about the beginnings of Lionism in Canada in District "A", and the addition of links to information for the Past District Governors' Association. The following are the major changes made during this past Lions year:

• The MD"A" Pin Collection is now featured on the History section of the web site

• Again, thanks to Lion Lynn Mathewson, all winning District Peace Posters for the years 2004 and 2005 are now available for viewing in the Peace Poster Gallery.

The Events page has information on the changes to the Friendship Arch program.
The Lions Web Forum now has a Coming Events section, available for any registered Lion to post Lions events for the sub-Districts of MD"A".

Brockville Lions Club are having a draw for SightFirst of Sports Memorabilia that will occur at the 2007 MDA Convention in London. Any funding raised by individual districts will be credited to that district. They are looking for permission to canvas all the Districts in MDA for prizes and to sell tickets. They also requested a set of labels for all the clubs.

Motion that permission be given for the Brockville Lions Club to canvas all the Districts in MDA for prizes and to sell tickets and that they be provided with a set of labels for all the clubs. Carried

A new 'Volunteer Screening Policy' for MD"A" was adopted for inclusion in the MD"A" Policy Manual and that the MD"A" Secretary be designated as the contact person for the coordination and management of the screening process.

The job description for the Promotion Committee, as amended, was adopted to replace the current job description in the Policy Manual.

A special Ad Hoc Committee be established, to undertake a comprehensive review of the MDA Constitution and By Laws with a mandate to realign the format with the standard LCI form and updating all elements to ensure consistency with LCI. This tasking would also include ensuring that the MDA Policy Manual is consistent with the MDA Constitution & By Laws.

PDG Wayne Hoey will be concluding his tenure as Multiple District "A" Secretary as soon as a replacement is selected.

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Lessons a Service Organization Learned from the Disasters of 2005

The newspapers and nightly newscasts are no longer filled with reports from South Asia on the tsunami. So let me briefly report on just one significant development affecting more than 2,500 residents of Aceh province in Indonesia. Over the past year, they have gradually moved into 570 single-family homes paid for by LCIF, Indonesian Lions and Lions from several other nations.

The two-room homes, constructed simply of wood with corrugated tin roofs, are wired for electricity and cost about US\$867 each to build. For most of the villagers, they are a marked improvement over where they lived before the disaster. These dwellings demonstrate several invaluable lessons that LCIF has learned from its members' experiences after the tsunami. These lessons have helped Lions throughout the U.S. and worldwide as they have assisted and continue to aid victims of the Gulf Coast hurricanes and the earthquakes in northern Pakistan and India. As governments and large organizations like the Red Cross handle the giant relief and reconstruction efforts, smaller groups make significant contributions of their own-and in ways that much-larger relief organizations have difficulty doing.

Lesson One: Local relationships and feet on the ground allow local service organizations - familiar with an affected region's political and other power brokers - to move swiftly to identify very specific needs and cut through politics and red tape to fill them, often more efficiently than large international organizations. By the time relief workers around the world learned of the tremendous disaster in South East Asia, members of Lions clubs and other local organizations already were rushing to the area with trucks loaded with water, medicine, food and blankets. We have more than 60,000 members in the affected areas-people who know the best ways to reach the devastated communities where there were no airports and major roads had been washed away. So it isn't surprising that Lions were the first organization to coordinate relief in many areas.

While there aren't any Lions clubs in Banda Aceh, many strong clubs exist in nearby Medan. The Lions quickly identified a village where the tsunami had wiped out every home and where a Lions member had worked previously with the village chief. Then Lions underwrote similar houses in two more villages. Banda Aceh's mayor was so impressed that he extended an unprecedented offer to the Lions to build homes in the capital city itself. The Lions' personal contacts and relationships with government leaders, business people, judges and others helped them get things done quickly. In Sri Lanka, Lions partnered with the government relief agency at the request of the country's president and the then-Minister of Housing, a Lion. They were given a police escort for the 60 truckloads of supplies they sent. Local contacts and relationships also helped Lions work with mostly rural communities hit by Hurricanes Katrina and Rita to identify immediate relief and long-term needs.

Lesson Two: Clear, accurate information is vital, for the short- and long-term. Service-organization members who grew up in a region can assess immediate needs and then mobilize in droves. Once immediate rescue efforts are completed, in-depth information can help plan and carry out long-term rebuilding. In Indonesia, Sri Lanka, Thailand and India, all hard hit by the tsunami, LCIF provided funds to build more than 1,300 homes to date, benefiting thousands of people. However, these homes could not have been built so quickly except for the information, hard work and expertise of the Lions in those countries. Lions around the world were quick to donate millions of dollars for relief assistance, but the foundation relied on local Lions in the field to assess, set priorities and provide the relief-in this case to get the new homes built. With Lions clubs in 197 countries, Lions members are always nearby and ready to help. Technology enables Lions from elsewhere to lend a hand. After Hurricane Katrina, LCIF set up an online Help Link to partner clubs in the Gulf Coast with clubs elsewhere that wanted to help. Just two days after the Help Link was created, 21 clubs made arrangements to send money, provide toys for Christmas, send supplies, replace club paraphernalia and travel to the Gulf Coast to fix the club houses or do other relief work.

Lesson Three: In times of disaster, while everyone and every organization wants to help, organizations and individuals must determine how to do this most effectively - especially since relief and rebuilding will take years. Lions clubs and Lions members aren't known as volunteer disaster-service providers. We have many priorities including helping the vision impaired and young people. Yet when disasters strike, we are eager to help. In the tsunami-affected region, we provided immediate relief followed by housing construction and economic development in villages such as rebuilding salt houses, a key industry. In the U.S., regions affected by the hurricanes, Lions also mobilized quickly to provide emergency relief but also supported longer-term projects. Because thousands of people lost their eyeglasses, Lions in the affected areas brought in Lions mobile vision vans and provided free vision testing and assistance in getting new glasses. We realize that our strength lies not in providing emergency relief, but in providing long-term assistance, even after the news cameras and the media leave and the major relief organizations move on to the next disaster. LCIF currently is providing funds for Lions of Mississippi and Louisiana to continue important service projects such as sight screenings, an eye bank and eye care services for the poor.

What the tsunami, the hurricanes and the earthquakes have made clear is that volunteer organizations play a major role to supplement and extend the efforts of the much larger nonprofit organizations or government agencies. Along with many other volunteer groups, we each contribute what we know best. And that adds up to quite a bit.

The Lioness of MD 'A' would like to take this opportunity to thank the Lions for their support of our Multiple District Lioness program over the years since 1992, when Lions International made the decision to eliminate recognition of Lioness beyond Club level.

That initial period of support within Multiple District 'A' has enabled us to grow into an efficient, self-sufficient organization with an excellent program and confident, capable leaders prepared to assist and support our Clubs, as they continue to work together with their Lions Clubs - to provide for the needs of their communities and live up to our motto "We Serve".

Although we are disappointed that the Lions of MD 'A' have chosen to remove the reference to the Lioness Program from their Constitution and Bylaws - we certainly understand the reasons for the decision, and we truly do appreciate the 14 years of support and encouragement that we have enjoyed.

Après une convalescence de quelques mois et avoir pris soin de lui pendant quelques semaines, M.Deschatelets a malheureusement très vite repris ses vieilles habitudes. « J'allais bien, donc je n'avais pas besoin de faire un suivi avec le docteur, et plus besoin non plus de faire attention à ma santé, se rappelle-t-il. Dix ans plus tard, j'ai fait de l'angine. J'ai alors consulté un médecin qui m'a dit de faire attention à moi. Ce que j'ai fait pendant quelques semaines, mais j'ai une fois de plus repris mes vieilles habitudes. Jusqu'en avril 2004, là où mon coeur s'est mis à battre beaucoup trop vite, pour aucune raison. C'est à cette époque que l'on m'a installé le défibrillateur. »

Depuis, le policier admet prendre beaucoup mieux soin de lui, notamment en surveillant son alimentation et en prenant religieusement ses médicaments.

« Mon expérience m'a permis de constater qu'en Outaouais, nous sommes très bien équipés, mais nous avons surtout la chance de pouvoir compter sur des personnes compétentes. Nous sommes entre de bonnes mains : ces gens-là sauvent des vies à tous les jours. »

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



The proud recipient of the 9th annual Edwin A. Baker Award is Lion Dave Hewitt of Port Carling Lions Club, District A-12. The Award was presented to him by Lion Ray Trudel at the Lions Closing Business Session on Sunday, June 04, 2006 at the Multiple District "A" Rainbow Convention in Niagara Falls. Lion Ray was the first recipient of this prestigious award in 1998.
