



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Getting Younger People To Join Lions

ou've probably heard or read about Generation X and Generation Y. These terms describe the age groups that followed Baby Boomers. The underlying assumption of naming people born in the same era is that they share a common identity, shared values or similar interests.

Lions in their 50s, 60s, 70s and even older came of age at a time when joining a service club was almost as automatic as enrolling your children in school or belonging to the church down the street. Civic involvement was considered almost automatic. But those days are gone. Members of Generation X and Y and those coming up behind them, as well as many of the later Baby Boomers, don't automatically do many things at all. They pick and choose and decide what they prefer. Their passion for service is probably no less genuine but they don't feel the same need to be part of a traditional service club.

So we Lions have our work cut out for us in recruiting new members. If we continue as we have, unmindful of how the world has changed, we won't be successful in adding members. But if we adjust and show flexibility, there will be more opportunities to recruit "new blood."

Change is not easy. Many clubs need to change, modifying practices and procedures. Even the more successful clubs need to anticipate the future and make subtle changes. We don't need to change who Lions are and what we do. But we do need to change how we do things.

My presidential theme is Challenge to Change. The world has changed and we need to change with it. A club has to find new ways to attract members. It has to find new ways to make meetings more interesting. So maybe a club can try out karaoke singing at its meetings. That may not work for every club but it may work for yours.



Or maybe the answer is a cyber club. Or maybe it's a new project that will more fully engage members, better attract the attention of the public and better serve the community.

Unless we understand younger people and their needs and wants and reshape our clubs accordingly, we won't be able to entice them to join. But if we are savvy about what we do and how we present ourselves to the public, it won't be just Generation X and Y that people will hear about. They'll know about Generation L, those service-minded younger people who become Lions.

A New Vision For SightFirst In Latin America

s grant administrator for three SightFirst projects in Colombia, Lion Jairo Contreras has personally seen the look of joy on the many faces of those who can see for the first time.

"A woman once visited my office, who just days before- after being blinded by cataracts- was notified that she was going into surgery. She asked if after her operation she could meet the person who helped her," he said. "To my surprise, she kneeled before me in my office with tears of happiness, giving thanks to the Lord for His miracle. I was very moved, and I will always remember it." Not typical to the day-to-day life of a civil engineer, this moment was made possible thanks to the SightFirst program. Before SightFirst, patients in Colombia waited up to four years for cataract operations.

SightFirst has prevented the loss of vision of 27 million people. However, the threats of blindness have changed over time. New complications and eye diseases emerge, therefore necessitating Campaign SightFirst II. CSFII aspires to achieve "Vision for All" and prevent the blind population from doubling from 37 to 74 million by the year 2020. The ongoing campaign hopes to raise at least \$150 million, with a target goal of \$200 million.

In Latin America, 342 SightFirst grants have been approved for a total of nearly \$24 million.

SightFirst began in 1990, and Contreras has been involved in three projects that performed 4,500 cataract surgeries in northeast Colombia. Poverty is intensified by regional violence and its resulting forced displacement. Many people do not have access to health care, let alone eye care. This district is about to begin a new project undertaking 2,000 operations.

Children in Argentina can rejoice in improved vision thanks to Lions' SightFirst efforts.

Dr. Felix Torres is an ophthalmologist at the National Arzobispo Loayza Hospital in Lima. He recently became a Lion after working with the clubs for the past five years on cataract surgery campaigns. After seeing firsthand the results Lions have achieved, he is also ready to begin a new SightFirst project to carry out 1,500 free cataract surgeries. Due to the high rate of school dropouts, as many as 1.2 million Peruvian children have visual problems that could be corrected by prescription glasses and Lions are working to fulfill that need, too.



Dr. Francisco Schreiber is a SightFirst advisor to Argentina and project chairperson to an ongoing grant in the northeast. "SightFirst's impact in the community is very positive. In addition to motivating the volunteerism of the Lions, it also encourages other institutions to participate in this noble work," he said. In fact, one provincial government implemented a public cataract program after the successful Lions' cataract campaigns. This relationship helps LCIF and Lions further leverage funding and support for the program.

Until now, all of the projects in Argentina have been cataract surgery campaigns, but Lions are developing long-term, sustainable projects. "As a doctor, I am convinced that the best actions are those of preventative education, even if it doesn't have the same immediate impact as the cataract surgery campaigns. In the long run, however, we will be able to measure our efforts by a decrease in visual problems," said Dr. Schreiber.

Through Campaign SightFirst II, Lions can ensure that no one will wait to receive eye care. No one with preventable blindness will be denied the right to sight.

Lions Use Cutting-Edge Technology

hermal imaging shows firefighters where victims lie helpless in their homes. Vacuum molded replicas teach the blind how dangerous implements work, without risk. Cancer treatment is administered by video. Paperless classrooms allow disabled students to trade heavy bookbags for USB ports. None of these projects came from science fiction novels. Instead, these are examples of successful LCIF grant projects.

Champions of humanitarian causes for decades, Lions today are embracing technology and assisting people in need in novel ways. One example is the thermal imaging system installed for the Cowlitz County Fire Department in Washington by the Lions of District 19-G, with a \$20,000 grant from LCIF. According to the U.S. Fire Administration within FEMA, the United States has a fire death rate of 12.4 deaths per million, one of the highest in the industrialized world. More than 100 firefighters are killed during rescues every year in the United States.

Thermal imaging cameras sense temperature variations in buildings and create an image on a small television screen. Instead of searching the smoke-filled building for survivors manually, firefighters equipped with thermal imaging cameras use the television screen to identify anyone trapped inside and plan their rescue in advance.

The inspiration for this project came from Lion Duane Bailey of the Longview-Kelso Earlybird Lions Club, who saw a special on thermal imaging cameras on NBC's Dateline. He became the driving force to provide these cameras to the local fire department. The Cowlitz Fire Department has now used the thermal cameras for four years, and not one fire-related fatality has occurred in that time.

In another technically-inspired project, Lions in District 330-A, Japan, are helping the visually impaired understand the world around them through touch. Vacuum forming machines create small, tactile replicas of everyday objects that are either dangerous or too large to touch. By creating a lightweight, durable model, visually impaired children and adults gain object recognition of items that would otherwise be unavailable.

Three-dimensional maps formed with the machines communicate spatial information to the blind and visually impaired and molded items with sharp edges can be explored by children without fear. Some 2,700 individuals are expected to see the world in a whole new way—with their fingers—through the use of these molding machines in Japan. The four molding machines were purchased through the assistance of a \$10,000 grant from LCIF.

Lions' projects run the gamut from cutting-edge genetic research to simple water filters, addressing the needs of the communities around them. As technology moves ahead and the Lions move with it, projects that seem beyond imagination become reality, thanks in part to LCIF grants.

In the 1941 Lion magazine we "Of all the novel and rich experiences which await a new lion, none strikes him so forcibly as the introduction to that 'Demon of the Dime' that 'Debunker of Dignity' known as the Spizzerinkter or Tail Twister."

No lexicographer has successfully challenged the Lions' claim to having thought up or dreamed up this term all by themselves. In the July 1936 Lions Magazine this erudite source said; some readers may be wondering about the word Spizzerinkter used in conjunction with tail twister. Spizzerinkters began to pop up in clubs throughout the association some months ago. They are close relatives of tail twisters-blood brothers in fact, and there is a definition-not by Webster- of their name.

Spizzerinkter n 1. A fire eater, a live wire, a gouger, a snapper, a pusher, a trail blazer, a wise cracker. 2. A lion with the qualities of dynamite, pepper, ginger, great heat, TNT 3. an official in a Lions Club who is redheaded, sharp, witty, alive, awake, quick, sizzling, speedy, high stepping, gate crashing,. Implies reckless partiality. 4. One who is in a state of perpetual eruption, as a volcano? One who has great zip?

The spizzerinkter has also been variously described as worse than a revolution, more touching than your most shiftless relative, and about as subtle as an avalanche, and as a new name for an old fashioned affliction – tail twister.

Melvin Jones said "that back in the early 1920's we were trying to find some way to liven up Lion meetings. About this time membership in Pep Committees had begun to dwindle and the survivors got the idea that they should be the ones doing the fining. One Sunday afternoon 3 or 4 of us were discussing the matter of putting pep into meetings. One fellow who had been born on a farm said that what we need to do what they used to do on the farm. When a cow refused to go through the gate some one would grab her tail and twist. We all laughed but one of the boys said "Why isn't that a good name – tail twister?" We had already decided on the name Lion Tamer for the sergeant at arms, so it seemed logical to confer the title of tail twister on the chairman of the pep committee."

But the International Board in a huff of offended dignity issued an edict to the clubs against the use of low comedy term. MJ remembers the issue came up in Ohio in 1920. Word came out of the room where the board was in session before luncheon that the term tail twister was prohibited. The rank and file membership took matters in their own hands during the luncheon by passing a motion in favour of tail twisting. The matter stayed around for years with the general consensus of the Boards remaining pretty much the same. That the terms tail twister, cub, lion tamer, and den should be dropped from Lionism."

PIP Ray Riley finally suggested that they were taking themselves too seriously, and suspected that clubs would go right on having tail twisters whether the board liked it or not.

In all thy humours, whether grave or mellow, thou art such a touch, testy, pleasant fellow; hast so much wit, and mirth, and spleen about thee, there is no living with thee nor without thee.

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS COMMITTEE

- 1. Denied vice district governor election complaint in District 300-C1 (Multiple District 300 Taiwan) and declared Lion Chen-Chin Liu as vice district governor of District 300-C1 for the 2007-2008 fiscal year.
- 2. Denied vice district governor election complaint in District 321-B2 (India) and declared Lion Kiran Singh as vice district governor of District 321-B2 for the 2007-2008 fiscal year.
- 3. Appointed Lion Md Mazibul Huq Chunnu as district governor and Lion Nishat Parveen Huq as vice district governor of District 315-B1 (Bangladesh) for the 2007-2008 fiscal year.
- 4. Upheld the vice district governor election complaint for District 324-E3 (India), declared the vice district governor election for the 2007-2008 fiscal year to be null and void and of no force and effect, and declared that there exists a vacancy in the office of vice district governor in District 324-E3 for the 2007-2008 fiscal year.
- 5. Denied vice district governor election complaint for District 315-B4 (Bangladesh) and declared Lion S.M. Ishaque as the vice district governor of District 315-B4 for the 2007-2008 fiscal year.
- 6. Revised board policy regarding electronic distribution of Board Policy Manual and Board Meeting Minutes to all those entitled by policy to receive copies of those documents, and to reflect actual procedure and practice with respect to the review of proposed changes to board policy by the Constitution and By-Laws Committee.
- 7. Revised the Standard Form Club Constitution and board policy with respect to the Club, District and Multiple District Dispute Resolution Procedures, the District Governor and Vice District Governor Election Complaints Procedure and the Constitutional Complaints Procedure.




Swim Class Grads





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
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
